Quad City Bald Eagle Days


The QCCA Expo Center held its annual Bald Eagle Days event on January 5-7 with record attendance. The attendance numbered 15,742 for



the weekend and 1,707 on the Friday school program day that included 84 classrooms from 37 schools! This year's theme was "A Place for All Seasons". Visitors to the "hands-on" booth had a chance to see what happens during all four seasons including learning about snow flakes, a frog's life cycle, bird watching, identifying trees, "traveling seeds" and the ever popular stream table. *Thank you* to all our volunteers who assisted at the booth!

School and Public Programs

From September-February of this school year, 2,344 students, teachers, and parents participated in 40 field trips at the Wapsi River Center. A total of 86 public presentations were attended by 1,624 participants. Thanks to the Iowa winter weather, cancellations did limit programs.

Winter Fun Day

This year's winter fun day on Saturday, February 17, was a great success and had record attendance (145 participants) for the day's activities. Although the frostbite star party was cancelled, due to weather, participants enjoyed the cross-country ski clinic conducted by Bob Bryant (previous Director), a snowshoe nature hike, a tour of the Eagle View Eco Center, a bald eagle program and observation and of course the supper hosted by the Friends of the Wapsi Center. We would like to thank the Friends group once again for the hearty and warm food and Clinton County Conservation for their use of the extra snowshoes (we had 58 shoeshoers alone!).

Wapsi River Center Rental Facilities

<u>Dormitory</u>: The Owl's Nest Dormitory is divided into two large rooms, each capable of sleeping 26 people. Each section has its own shower and rest room facilities. Full dorm rental is \$300 per night. If you have a smaller group, you may rent sections of the dorm as needed. Partial rental options start at \$80. Kitchen and dining/meeting space are available in Redtail Lodge and the Eagle View Eco Center.

Meeting and Dining Facilities: Rustic Redtail Lodge (capacity: 50) has a kitchen, meeting/dining room with gas fireplace, and rest rooms. The Eagle View Eco Center has a kitchen, meeting room (capacity: dining, 70; meeting, 100) and

rest rooms. Meeting room fees are \$50/day and kitchen fees are \$15/day. The \$15 kitchen fee is waived for groups renting any part of dorm and a meeting room.

<u>Cabin</u>: Kestrel Cabin has one bedroom with a queen-size bed, 2 twin-size cots, a combination kitchen and living

room with a full-size foldout couch, gas heat, airconditioning and a bathroom with a shower. Rental fee: \$30/day.

Scott County Conservation Board Seeks Candidates for AmeriCorps Program

AmeriCorps, the domestic Peace Corps, has engaged more than 70,000 Americans in community service each year. Most AmeriCorps members are selected by and serve with local and national organizations.



The Scott County Conservation Board (SCCB) is currently a participating member of the Eastern Iowa Conservation Alliance (EICA). The EICA has been awarded an AmeriCorps grant through the Corporation for National Service and the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service. A full-time enrollment period is September through August, and currently we are authorized for two AmeriCorps members with a possible third position to be awarded to the SCCB.

Full-time AmeriCorps members receive a modest living allowance, health insurance, student loan deferment, and receive a \$4,725 education award, upon completion of 1700 hours, to help finance or to pay back student loans. Half-time positions (900 hrs.) receive a modest living allowance, student loan deferment, and receive a \$2,363 education award. The half-time position hourly rate may be adjusted, based upon education and experience.

SCCB AmeriCorps members serve as naturalists at the Wapsi River Environmental Education Center and assist with the educational programming and maintenance of the Center, and potentially at the other parks. They have played an instrumental role in the Center's increased educational programming and attendance.

The AmeriCorps program is a great way for college graduates to get a start in the field as well as gain valuable experience. Invasive Species Cleared

Over 10 acres of autumn olive (*Elaeagnus umbellata*) were cut in February thanks to maintenance staff from Scott County Park. Operators cut shrubs and trees north of the main power lines from the main trail to the observatory and around the amphitheater. This introduced species tolerates low nitrogen levels in the soil and produces many seeds to out compete native plants. Management of the area will be needed and may include mowing, hand cutting, chemical treatments and fire – so volunteers be ready!

Former SCCB Director **Dan Nagle Leaves His Path in Scott County**

Dan Nagle, 70, of Long Grove, IA, passed away on Friday, March 2, and was buried at St.



Anne's Cemetery in Long Grove, IA. In serving the SCCB for 30 years, Nagle set the course for thousands of visitors to enjoy the many Scott County sites within the park system including historical as well as natural recreation sites. The Walnut Grove Pioneer Village now bears his name in recognition of his dedication and commitment to conservation since his retirement in 1988. His love of nature helped in acquiring many facilities and lands including the Wapsi River Environmental Education Center. Dan Nagle will be remembered.







Wildlife Profile ~ Am. Woodcock by Renae Hanson, AmeriCorps Naturalist

In Iowa, the American woodcock, also known as the timber-doodle, begins arriving mid-March through early April. Its scientific name, *Scolopax minor*, translates "little lover of the swamps or bogs". Although a member of the shorebird family, the American woodcock has adapted quite well and shows preference toward uplands rather than marshes. Its upland habitat must have rich soil with brushy understory for roosting and cover. It prefers to nest and roost near pastures or abandoned farmland.

Having never seen an American woodcock, ones first encounter may spark a phrase such as "what on earth was that?" The American woodcock is a small bird, with brown camouflage coloration that blends perfectly into the ground litter on the forest floor. Its body is plump and its legs are short but what is uncommon is its head. It has an excessively long beak and large bulging dark eyes that sit back on its head farther than other birds. These are all characteristics that seem unusual for a bird that inhabits an upland forest, yet all have purpose for this bird.

The American woodcock's short legs allow it to take cover under dense brush. The length of its beak is almost 3 inches! Its beak is stern yet flexible, allowing the bird to probe into the rich moist soil while still being able to extract earthworms and other invertebrates. Earthworms make up 90% of the woodcocks diet. The large, bulging dark eyes set far back on the head allow the bird to see in all directions, including behind it.


A sure sign of spring is when the American robin begins arriving and the woodpeckers begin tapping into maple trees. Now is that time – let the courtship begin!

Beginning in March, most migratory birds are heading back to their old nesting grounds to start a new family. Some will return and have the same mate they've had for years and others will return to select a new mate.

Generally, it's the male who really has to prove to the female that he is worthy, possibly by: strutting his display of bright colors, a serenade, rumbling with another male or even a beautiful dance may attract her to him. Whichever courting ritual the male displays, it will be dramatic and intense at that

The male American woodcock begins courting by performing a ritual sky dance that starts in the early evening as light begins to fade into dark. First, on the ground in an open or abandoned field, close to the forest or dense shrub where female nesting habitat is likely, he starts with approximately 5 minutes of nasal "peents" that repeats in 20-second intervals. He then begins his sky dance by swirling upward into the sky, similar to an upside down tornado. Close to the ground each loop around is wide and begins to narrow as he reaches a desired height of 100-500 feet. During the assent, the wings make a twittering sound as they beat. Once reaching the desired height, he suddenly descends as if injured. Although seeming reckless, it is very well planned. During the descent, he emits a series of chirps until reaching the ground in the exact place in which he began. From beginning to end the sky dance lasts around 60 seconds, only to start all over on the ground and beginning again with the nasal "peents". The American woodcock continues the ritual for nearly an hour, and then rests until early morning where he begins the same ritual all over lasting another hour. The male will perform the sky dance every day until a female selects him as her mate; however, the male American woodcock is not monogamous, and may pass on his genes with more than one female.

The male American woodcock will begin courting soon after migration during late March into early April. If you would like to witness the American woodcock's dynamic sky dance, come join others at Sherman Park, located in Clinton County on April 9 at 7:30 P.M. See calendar for more information.



Plant Profile ~ Blue Cohosh by Paula Mullin, AmeriCorps Naturalist

words, what looks like nine separate leaflets is actually the one leaf. The leaf of blue cohosh may become two feet or more across, with the plant growing to three feet tall. Before the leaf reaches its full size; however, the flowers typically appear.

Some may agree with Aldo Leopold that, "One skein of geese, cleaving the murk of a March thaw, is the spring." Others might wait for the Vernal Equinox to affirm its beginning. Either way, it is finally spring! The exuberance of new growth, or rather rebirth, and warming temperatures make spring a fabulous time to be outdoors. Woodland trails are among the many great places to celebrate the changing season, as several wildflowers start blooming in March and early April. As you hike, keep your eyes out for a smooth, bluish stem with a large, single unfolding leaf toward the top. It may be the distinctive early growth of blue cohosh, *Caulophyllum thalictroides*, a native perennial.

Blue cohosh blooms in April and May but the tiny flowers, less than a half-inch across, do not draw great attention to the plant. Each flower within the inflorescence (cluster of flowers) has six petals and sepals. The petals are green to yellow-green and are opposite green sepals. Having an equal number of petals and sepals, opposite each other, is characteristic of species in the barberry family (*Berberidaceae*), with the exception of Mayapple. The fruit of blue cohosh contain two seeds with a protective fleshy covering. They resemble blueberries upon ripening in late summer and help the plant stand out against other woodland flora. While they may look good, fruits of the plant are

poisonous to humans. The plant itself

may be an irritant to the skin. Nonetheless, blue

cohosh has a long history of medicinal use.

Blue cohosh grows in moist, rich soil of woodlands and initially stands out against the relative bareness of the understory in early spring. One aerial stem rises per season from a perennial rootstock (also called a rhizome) that grows horizontally underground. Since only one shoot is produced per season, the age of the plant can be determined by counting the scars on the rhizome left by previous growth. The rhizome of blue cohosh is matted, knotty and guite thick. The name "cohosh" actually comes from an Algonquian word meaning, "rough" which references the feel of the rhizome when handled. Therefore, the name blue cohosh describes the bluish stem and rhizome of the plant it designates in clever fashion.

Native Americans used blue cohosh to address several ailments. Most often sought after were the rhizomes and roots, which were harvested in late fall. They were ground into a powder and used as a remedy for rheumatism, colic, bronchitis and menstrual cramps. Above all, the plant was used as an aid in childbirth. It was taken only in the last two weeks of pregnancy to induce rapid and relatively painless labor. Early settlers also used blue cohosh as an aid in childbirth, but called the plant squawroot and papoose root. It is actually still used by herbalists today, including one midwife whom I spoke to about the plant.

Scientific names can be descriptive of appearance as well. For example, *Caulophyllum* comes from the Greek word *kaulos* meaning "stem" and from
