**SCCB at the Wapsi Center Awarded!** In spring the Wapsi Center was recognized and awarded the 2013 Chris Holt Youth Environmental Education Award by the Iowa Association of Naturalists (IAN) and the Iowa Conservation Education Coalition. The award recognizes outstanding environmental education for youth, and was awarded for the Outdoor P.E. Program with Davenport Community School District. The program supported about 450 students and included aquatic stewardship while participating in low impact recreation activities like fishing, canoeing, and kayaking at West Lake Park in Davenport, Iowa. Also recognized by IAN, were four staff at the Center, for Professional Development requiring a minimum of 20 hours of educating, communication, administrative, certification, and professional service and training.

# **Stewardship Workday**


Another spring workday was a success thanks to 19 volunteers including our own *Friends* 







ANTMAL PROFILE: WH17E-7HR 0ATED SPARROW **By Seasonal Assistant Naturalist, Emily Warren** 

Also known as the Whistler of the North, the White-throated Sparrow, *Zonotrichia albicolli*, is an attractive bird with crisp facial markings. It has black eye stripes and a crown stripe that are interrupted by stripes that fade from bright yellow at the beak to white. It also has a white throat that makes you look twice. These sparrows are slightly larger than a Song Sparrow and have very different behaviors.

The White-throated Sparrow is a ground forager that hops along, often using both feet at once to scratch back the leaf litter




and then pounce on anything they uncover. It will also toss leaves aside with a flick of its head. They eat seeds and berries as well as a large number of insects. They prefer areas of low, dense vegetation like

thickets, hedgerows, and weedy fields. In summer, they are found in forests of Canada, the northeastern U.S., and the northern Midwest. As winter approaches, they move southward; their range sprawls as low as southwestern California to Florida.

They nest on or very low to the ground under shrubs, grasses, or beneath dead vegetation and only use their nests one time. If a White-throated Sparrow has previously lost a low lying nest to a predator, it will likely build a subsequent nest up off the ground that same year. They stay with their mates for the summer and then go their separate ways, finding a new mate the next year. They lay 1-6 eggs per clutch. The eggs are very light blue or light greenish blue speckled with chestnut and lilac colored markings. These birds have a one of a kind wavering whistle that sounds like its saying "Oh sweet Canada, Canada, Canada".

Interestingly, White-throated Sparrows are polymorphic, which means that they come in two color phases: white-striped and tanstriped. The colors are genetically determined. Both males and females can be either color and even more interestingly, males of both

colors prefer white-crowned females, while females of both colors prefer tan-crowed males. White-crowned birds tend to be more aggressive as well. They form large migratory flocks that forage together and there is a hierarchy that exists between them. Males are typically dominant over females, but the color seems to have no bearing on status.

Even though they aren't very closely related and look nothing alike, White-throated Sparrows often mates with Dark-eyed Juncos and produce hybrid offspring, which look like grayish, dull colored White-throated Sparrows with white outer tail feathers.

These birds are common across their range, but according to the North American Bird Survey, their numbers declined between 1996 and 2010. Many migratory birds face habitat loss, predation by outdoor cats, and light pollution in large cities.

FUNGUS PROFILE: CEDAR - APPLE RUST GALL

on galls (tumor like growths on plants formed by insects, our booth at the Earth Week Fair this past April, I

Cedar - Apple Rust Gall stumbled upon this queer looking gall online. It was round, found on a Red Cedar tree and had ORANGE TENTACLES! It looked truly amazing and I thought that I would never be so lucky as to see one in real life.

A few days later we went on a hike to find gall specimens for our display. Looking high and low, my eye was drawn to some brown spheres in the Red Cedar tree, Juniperus virginiana, and there it was; a Cedar time apple blossoms are in the pink stage, the -Apple Rust Gall, Gymnosporangium juniperi-virginianae! At the time it was not showing its tentacles, but a few weeks later after some rain they were covered in tentacles! It was time to delve deeper into research!

This gall is formed by a fungus that requires two different trees in order to reproduce; the Red Cedar and an apple tree.



The spores that are produced on the Red Cedar can only affect the apple tree and the spores produced by the apple tree can only affect the Red Cedar tree. Usually these galls do not harm the Red Cedar, but they can cause serious disease on the apple trees. Damage to the apple tree

While doing research includes defoliation, deformed and small fruit, and even death of the tree.

The life cycle, simply put, begins with the

apple tree developing bacteria, or fungi) for yellow-orange blisters on the leaves that are surrounded by a red ring. The top side of the leaf develops black spots called "spermogonia" that release spores into the air between June and September. These spores, called

"aeciospores", make their way through the air and land on a Red Cedar leaf where small galls appear the following summer and mature the following spring.

After a few warm spring rains, about the galls extrude gelatinous tendrils from the circular or pocket-like depressions on all sides of the galls called "telia". These "telia" are comprised of thousands of two-celled spores called "teliospores" which are carried by the wind to a neighboring apple tree. Swelling and drying of telial tentacles may occur 8-10 times during the season and each time, the horns push out further and expose more teliospores until the supply is exhausted. Most galls produce teliospores for only one season; thus completing the cycle!

If you have an apple tree with this gall on it, have no fear, there are fungicides out there that can help. There are also methods such as separating the trees from each other by transplanting them or chopping one down. For more information on control of this gall, please refer to appropriate pest management guidelines.
