



PLANT PROFILE: RATTLESNAKE MASTER

As our prairies full bloom in summer we will begin to see a diverse pallet of colorful wildflowers. Amongst the vibrant colors is a dull, odd shaped flowering plant with an equally odd name: Rattlesnake Master. This

> plant serves an important role in prairie

ecosystems and is culturally significant to the native inhabitants of central North America, including those of present day Scott County.

Rattlesnake Master (Eryngium yuccifolium) is identified by its many dense, ball-shaped flowering heads, or inflorescences. A single plant can have up to 20 inflorescences that grow in umbels, where several

flower stalks originate from a common point on the plant's stems. Each inflorescence contains many small, whitish green flowers as well as white bracts (modified leaves) that stick out sharply between flowers to give it a rough, prickly appearance and feel. Flowers will begin to bloom in June or July and

continue into September. The leaves are long, narrow, sharp-tipped, and fibrous. They grow in a rosette around the base of the plant, and strongly resemble those of the Yucca plant, hence the Latin name

vuccifolium, meaning "Yuccalike leaves." Because the leaves are flat and durable they are used in they are of weaving baskets and sandals by Native American groups. The plant typically grows to

be 4-5' tall and has a long taproot with a dense, and grasslands come into fibrous rootstalk that is well adapted to dry conditions. Rattlesnake Master is a member of the carrot family (Apiaceae). The leaves contain many of the same oils and compounds as carrots, parsley, and parsnip, and will produce a similar smell when crushed.

> The roots of Rattlesnake Master can be used to treat some medical conditions. Roots are either pounded into a powder, chewed, or steeped in a tea. It is known to be a diuretic, help to relieve fevers, and help with upset stomachs. The common name of the plant comes from the practice of some Native Americans who use its roots and sap as a treatment for snake bites. Notable among these are the Meskwaki of eastern Iowa. While there is little to no evidence for the efficacy of the plant in treating snakebites, the belief in its effectiveness may be enough to elicit a response by the brain to relieve some symptoms of pain or discomfort, similar to a placebo.

Rattlesnake Master is an important plant for a variety of insects. It serves as the host plant for the Rattlesnake Master Borer Moth, whose caterpillars feed solely on the stems and roots of the plant. This

species now consists of few isolated populations in fragmented prairies where Rattlesnake Master is abundant. Caterpillars of the Black Swallowtail Butterfly feed on the leaves of this plant and other members of the carrot family. It produces large quantities of nectar that feeds many different butterflies, bees, and predatory wasps. Predatory wasps can be beneficial in garden and landscape settings as they mitigate damage by a

number of different pest species such as aphids. A wide variety of bees and soldier beetles collect the pollen of Rattlesnake Master to feed themselves and their larva. For these reasons in addition to the plant's hardiness and drought resistance, Rattlesnake Master is well liked for native prairie plantings. It is also becoming increasingly appreciated as an ornamental and in gardens because of the beneficial insects it attracts.

ANIMAL PROFILE: GREAT CRESTED FLYCATCHER

down our wooded trail in search of birds. we were able to see several birds moving about the forest growth. Many birds like to pick around for bugs in the understory, while some are higher up in the canopy. Often identification is tricky unless seen through binoculars, or if you are familiar with the bird's vocalizations. Recently we spotted one of the more showy birds that can be seen during the summer months in

eastern Iowa woodlands the Great Crested Flycatcher, *Myiarchus crinitus*.

The Great Crested Flycatcher is an amazing bird which inhabits woodlands and prefers dwelling high up in the forest canopy. It belongs to the group a group of birds called the Tyrant flycatchers, family *Tyrannidae*. Birds belonging to the group have large heads, broad shoulders, narrow bodies and long tails. The group includes common bird groups such as kingbirds, phoebes, and pewees. The Great Crested Flycatcher is a showy bird, about the size of an American Robin. The bird has a brownish gray head, black eye, black bill, gray throat. gray wings and a striking lemon yellow colored belly. The crest is not always displayed.

The Call of the Great Crested Flycatcher is very distinctive. Males will sing a three-part song composed of two short whistles: a *wheerreep* followed by a higher-pitched *whee*, and a soft low *churr*. This song is meant to be heard by a mate at short distances, indicating periods of low disturbance and stress typically intensifying just before dawn.

The Great Crested Flycatcher are sit and wait predators, who perch high in deciduous trees in the summer. Their main food base consists of larger insects and spiders. Butterflies, moths, beetles, crickets, grasshoppers, and even bees and wasps. They are also known to eat some fruits and berries, when in

While leading a group down our wooded trail in search of birds, we were able to see several birds moving about the forest growth. Many birds season. Hunting tactics involve perching and observing the surrounding foliage or open areas. When potential prey items are spotted, the bird will dive and catch their prey, many times right out of the air, and return to the same perch to feed. Another technique is to hover above leaves or flowering plants picking off insects or berries while flying.

Preferred breeding habitat occurs in deciduous forests or mixed woodlands. Often they can be seen along wooded edges perching high up on dead tree branches. They prefer open canopy areas and can be seen near recently cleared open forest areas. These birds are cavity nesters searching for holes in dead trees. An abandoned woodpecker nest is an ideal nest site. They are known to use nest boxes if placed in their habitat. Nest material includes a mass of twigs, leaves, hair, feathers, bark, and even trash items. Snakeskins are commonly found in their nesting materials. One theory is that shed snake skins are used to frighten away would be predators.

The Great Crested Flycatcher is known to be monogamous and pairs will migrate and nest for consecutive years during their life span. After nest building, four to eight eggs are laid in the nest cavity and the parents will incubate them for 2 weeks. Upon hatching the young will spend another 2 weeks in the nest before fledging. Both parents will feed the young by catching insects, but the female takes the leading role.

In fall the Great Crested Flycatcher begins its migration to overwintering grounds in Florida,

Mexico, South America and the Philippines. Upon the arrival of spring, Great Crested Flycatchers begin their northern migration to breeding grounds.

Next time you are out along a woodland trail this summer keep your eyes open, look high in the tree canopy and you just might get to see the Great Crested Flycatcher!
