#### *Monitor Health Status*

##### Communicable Disease Program

Sixteen communicable diseases were reported during January. They included four cases of hepatitis C, nine cases of pertussis, and one case each of hepatitis B, cryptosporidiosis, and salmonellosis.

##### Rabies Risk Assessments

Twenty-three individuals required rabies risk assessments after exposures to twelve dogs, four cats, and seven bats. Rabies post exposure prophylaxis was recommended for sixteen individuals.

##### Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program

In January, there were thirteen children receiving individual case management. Of those, one had a blood lead level between 20-44 ug/dL and two had a blood level between 15-19 ug/dL. The remaining ten children had a blood lead level less than 15 ug/dL. Twenty-five children with an initial blood lead level between 10-14 ug/dL were receiving supportive services (visual

inspections, education over the telephone, appointment reminders) for lead poisoning this month. Of those, seventeen had a blood lead level between 10-14 ug/dL and eight had a blood lead level less than 10 ug/dL. These children receive public health nursing support until two consecutive blood lead levels equal to or below 5 ug/dL are obtained.

Eight children attending the Scott County Health Department's (SCHD) Immunization Clinic accepted lead testing services during their visit. Six children were between the ages of one and two years. Two children were between the ages of three and six year. One new positive was identified during this effort. Scott County WIC locations completed twenty-seven lead tests in December; no new positive cases were identified.

### *Diagnose/Investigate Health Problems and Hazards*

#### Sexually Transmitted Disease Program

Eighty-six clients received sexually transmitted disease (STD) clinic services during January. Nine clients tested positive for chlamydia, five tested positive for gonorrhea, and one tested positive for syphilis at the Health Department's clinic. In total, eighty-three cases of chlamydia, thirty-six cases of gonorrhea, five cases of syphilis, and one HIV case were reported in Scott County during the month.

### *Evaluate Effectiveness, Accessibility and Quality*

#### First Med Pharmacy Review

In December, two hundred and forty-five inmates received one thousand, one hundred and seventy-six prescriptions. The use of generic medication was at ninety-seven percent.

#### 2018 Year-end Community-Based Screening Services Quality Assurance Report

The Iowa Community-Based Screening Services (CBSS) 2018 Final Report stated that the statewide chlamydia positivity rate was 9 percent and gonorrhea rate was 4.5 percent. This was compared to the 2017 rates of 9 percent for chlamydia and 3.9 percent for gonorrhea. This was the third year that the gonorrhea rate increased in the state.

CBSS data showed that 54.4 percent of those tested in 2018 were female; 45.6 percent were male. Females were more likely to have a positive chlamydia test, while males were more likely to be positive for gonorrhea. Sixty-five percent of positive chlamydia tests were in those under the age of twenty-five. For gonorrhea, 37 percent of the positive tests were in those under the age of twenty-five. African American or multi-race individuals were disproportionately affected, having higher positivity rates, and a higher percentage of positive tests.

### Immunization Benchmark Reports

Program staff generated immunization benchmarks reports for individuals residing in Scott County. The data was as of December 31, 2018. Scott County showed a one percent increase in all three benchmarks reports since the report was last generated in August of 2018.

### *Develop Policies and Plans*

#### Community Health Improvement Plan

The 2018 Community Health Assessment prioritized Mental Health; Nutrition, Physical Activity, and Weight; and Access to Healthcare as the top needs needing to be addressed in the community in the next three years. A workgroup has been developed for each need area to brainstorm and draft the 2019 Scott County Community Health Improvement Plan. Scott County and Rock Island County Health Department staff co-hosted the first of three workgroup meetings scheduled for January. Scott County Health Department staff led community partners in attendance through activities to discuss the resources, forces, and barriers surrounding mental health needs in the community. Top goal areas under the strategic issues of mental health were identified. Strategies will be developed for each of these goal areas in the second meeting that will take place in February. Initial meetings of the Nutrition, Physical Activity, and Weight and Access to Healthcare workgroups were cancelled due to the inclement weather that took place the last weeks of January. These meetings are being rescheduled for February.

Health Equity Committee

The department's Health Equity Committee is working to identify strengths, weaknesses, and opportunities for improvement in meeting the Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services (CLAS) standards. Members of the committee used feedback from a department-wide staff survey and previous ratings in the different areas of CLAS standards to determine the department's current status in meeting the standards and to develop its 2019 plan.

CHANGE Tool Reassessment Completed for the City of Princeton

Staff completed the Community-At-Large Community Health Assessment and Group Evaluation (CHANGE) Tool reassessment with the City of Princeton. In the last year, the City of Princeton has adopted a Tobacco-Free and Nicotine-Free Resolution, promoted Quitline Iowa, conducted a comprehensive walk audit and filled in sidewalk gaps, and received six bicycle racks to install in community parks and common areas.

*Enforce Laws and Regulations*Immunization Audits

Immunization audits for schools were completed and reported to the Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH). Reports will be emailed to the appropriate school nurses, principals and superintendents in February. The total Scott County student enrollment was 29,829 for the 2018-2019 school year. Of the 29,829 students enrolled, 28,682 (96.12%) had certificates of immunizations, 108 (0.36%) had provisional certificates, 960 (3.22%) children had religious exemptions, 71 (0.24%) children had medical exemptions, and 8 (0.03%) had an unacceptable or no certificate (Attachment 2).

Immunization audits in the child care centers were completed and reported to IDPH in January. The total enrollment in the 107 licensed child care centers and preschools audited was 6,171. Of those 6,171 children, 5,907 (95.72%) had certificates of immunization, 63 (1.02%) had provisional certificates, 9 (0.15%) had medical exemptions, 182 (2.95%) had religious exemptions, and 10 (0.16%) had an unacceptable or no certificate (Attachment 3).

Update Regarding Cockroach Complaint in LeClaire.

The LeClaire cockroach complaint has been officially closed. Treatment by a professional pest control service has been completed and verified.

Update Regarding Bat Complaint at Bettendorf Rental Property

Regarding a documented bat infestation at a Bettendorf property, charges against the owner for his failure to abate the infestation have been dropped since the owner is no longer offering the house for rent.

Owner-Occupied Condominium Complaint

Health Department staff worked with Scott County Community Services to assist a property manager in dealing with an owner occupied condominium full of trash. The condominium is in a building which shares walls on both sides with other dwelling units. The next door neighbors

have been smelling the garbage as this individual has allowed garbage to pile up inside the unit. There have also been problems with water infiltrating into the next door units. Complainants filed court papers with the hopes of getting the individual some assistance. A judge denied to issue a court order for a mental health commitment. More problems arose, and the situation worsened by the extreme cold weather. Efforts to address this complaint are ongoing.

#### Bed Bug Investigation at Davenport Public Library Locations

Staff received a complaint regarding bed bugs at the Davenport Public Library, Fairmount location. After contacting the library's facility management staff, it was confirmed that the library is currently monitoring and treating both the Fairmount and Main Street locations. Bed bugs had been discovered in DVD cases which were returned to the Main Street location.

#### *Research for new insights and innovative solutions*

#### Efforts to Store Employee Health Records in Electronic Content Management System Underway

Staff met with Scott County Information Technology programmers to discuss the Employee Health Program. During the meeting, the various types of records that exist were discussed. The current Employee Health Database was also reviewed. The current project will integrate the Employee Health Database with OnBase, Scott County's electronic content management software.

#### Department to Receive Funds to Begin Work on Trauma Informed Care

IDPH offered SCHD a \$5,000 stipend to begin work on trauma informed care practices. Funds were available to a limited number of Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health (MCAH) agencies. Scott County's population has a higher than average adverse childhood experience (ACE) score as demonstrated through data collected in Iowa's Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System. The department will be required to participate in a brief pre and post organizational assessment to be completed online, collaborate with IDPH staff to identify potential areas of focus, have at least one staff member participate in monthly reflective learning webinars, and submit a brief narrative report. Funds must be spent by June 30, 2019.

## **Assurance**

### *Link People to Needed Personal Health Service*

#### Developmental Screenings Continue to be Provided

Staff completed the Ages and Stages Growth and Development screening process with two families during January. One family was concerned that their child was having “too many tantrums and staring into space” when spoken to, and the other family was worried about their child’s ability to communicate. Both children’s scores reflected a need for referral to the Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency (AEA) for additional assessments and possible therapeutic services. At time of follow-up, both families were in the process of being scheduled for assessment appointments.

#### Presumptive Eligibility Applications Submitted

Staff provided Presumptive Eligibility (PE) application services to a pregnant mother, a high school student living independently, and a mother and her two children. The applications for PE were approved for the expectant mother, high school student, and the two children. Information on local obstetricians, family doctors, pediatricians, and dentists taking new Iowa Medicaid services were provided. In addition, information on additional community resources were provided.

#### HIV/Hepatitis C Outreach Testing Continues

Regular HIV/hepatitis C (HCV) counseling, testing, and referral services were provided at Rosecrance New Life Outpatient Center, Center for Alcohol & Drug Services (CADS), and Humility of Mary Shelter in January. Additionally, a new partnership began with Trinity Public Health in Muscatine to provide prevention education and free HIV/HCV testing to clients at New Horizons substance abuse treatment facility and shelter participants at Muscatine Center for Social Action (MCSA). Services to Alcohol and Drug Dependency Services (ADDS) in Burlington was rescheduled in January due to weather conditions. Twenty-one individuals were tested for HIV and nine for HCV during January at outreach testing sites.

#### Non-Public School Health Screenings

Staff continued school health screenings in the non-public schools during January. One hundred twenty children were screened for vision and fifty-four children were screened for dental issues. Five children were referred for vision and four children were referred for dental services. One child was referred for both dental and vision services.

#### Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health Direct Services Provided at WIC

Staff provided direct services at WIC for both Maternal Health clients and Child Oral Health Clients. Services for Maternal Health clients included care coordination, presumptive eligibility, health education, Medicaid risk assessment, depression screenings, and connecting clients to doctors, dentists, and resources. Services for Child Oral Health included dental screenings, fluoride varnish application, oral health education, care coordination, and referrals to

providers. Additionally, families are offered community resources and linkage to other programs.

### *Assure a Competent Public and Personal Health Workforce*

#### Lead Education to Medical Providers

Staff spoke about childhood lead poisoning with providers at UnityPoint Family Medicine's 53<sup>rd</sup> Street office. Education was provided regarding childhood lead poisoning prevention and best practice guidelines for lead poisoning detection and medical management. Additionally, education was provided regarding the Immunization and *Care for Kids* Programs offered at the Scott County Health Department.

#### Infant Feeding Webinar

Staff participated in the webinar "Infant Feeding for a Lifetime of Healthy Eating." The presenters described the importance of responding to an infant's developmental readiness when feeding, including bottle feeding techniques and when to incorporate complimentary foods.

#### Teaching Personal Safety Webinar

Staff participated in the webinar "Teaching Personal Safety in Early Childhood: Tools for Preventing Abuse." The presenters described ways to teach young children the principles of personal safety within the context of developmentally appropriate practice.

#### Emotional Intelligence Webinar

Staff participated in the webinar "Inclusive Early Childhood Education Programs and Educator Emotional Quotient: Strategies for Developing Teachers' Emotional Intelligence." The presenter described emotional intelligence as understanding and managing yourself in order to understand others and manage relationships. Strengthening emotional intelligence helps to change the environment and build strong relationships with children with diverse abilities.

#### Systems Change Webinar

Staff attended the Great Lakes Breastfeeding webinar, "A Systems Approach to Effective Sustainable Change." The speakers discussed key elements that must be present for change to happen successfully. They emphasized the importance of focusing efforts on changing systems rather than individuals, and using diverse data sources (from multiple perspectives) to inform decision making and assure equitable outcomes. The speakers conveyed the importance of being connected to the community members served, noting that "the answers always lie within the community."

#### Iowa Bicycle Summit

Staff attended and presented at the Iowa Bicycle Summit. Plenary speakers covered topics on the Great American Rail Trail; MetroQuest: Evolution of Public Input; and Automated Vehicles and Bicycles. Staff attended breakout sessions on Advisory Bike Lanes, Cedar Rapids Pedestrian Master Plan/Scott County Health Department Promotes Walking, and Complete Streets in Des

Moines/Redesigning an MPO Bikeway Plan. SCHED staff presented information on the value of walking and walkable design from a public health perspective, infrastructure factors, and walkable environment design elements to creating walkable communities. In addition, staff introduced the Scott County Walk Audit Toolkit and Comprehensive Sidewalk Policy sample.

#### Social Network Strategy Recruiter Engagement Webinar

Staff participated in the webinar “SNS Coaching Booster Session: Enhance Your Engagement and Coaching of Recruiters.” Social Network Strategy (SNS) is an evidence supported approach to engaging and motivating individuals to get tested for HIV/HCV and to accept other support services. This webinar was an update/supplement to an in person training attended in early 2018 and focused on effective coaching of individuals to act as recruiters in an SNS. Qualities of effective recruiters were reviewed and updated strategies for creating recruitment plans that ensure the safety and confidentiality of both recruiters and network associates were described. The importance of flexibility regarding modes of communication for follow-up was emphasized, with the recommendation to accommodate the use of different social media platforms along with traditional text messaging and phone calls.

#### Strategic National Stockpile Training

Staff attended a Strategic National Stockpile (SNS) training at Scott Emergency Communication Center. This training was a grant funded opportunity provided to the Region 5A Preparedness Coalition to assist with its work in creating a regional point of dispensing plan that addresses responding to an event large enough to require a nine-county response. The training detailed the SNS process from start to finish and what situations need to occur for these requests can be made. Information gained from this training will be used to create the regional plan later this year.

#### *Inform, Educate, and Empower People About Health Issues*

##### Retirees from Modern Woodmen Learn About Oral Health

Staff met with a group of retirees from Modern Woodmen of America to present information regarding the I-Smile™ Silver Program. Twenty-three retirees attended the event and were eager to learn about oral health for seniors; not only for themselves, but others in their communities.

##### Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health Program Outreach

Staff delivered Child and Adolescent Health materials to thirty-four Scott County elementary schools. These materials will be provided to families at upcoming Kindergarten Round-up events at Scott County schools.

Staff completed in-person program outreach meetings with eighteen medical offices and mailed an outreach letter to sixty-eight dental offices. Outreach information was e-mailed to school nurses at thirty-five schools in the Davenport and Pleasant Valley School Districts. School nurses were also encouraged to consider becoming certified to help students and their families with completing presumptive eligibility Medicaid applications.



Staff presented to thirty-five staff at IowaWORKS about MCAH and other SCHD programs. IowaWORKS staff provide services to job seekers, of all ages and backgrounds, including those that might also benefit from SCHD programs and services. IowaWORKS staff also offered information as to how best to connect SCHD clients to their services.

### *Mobilize Community Partnerships*

#### Partnership with UnitedHealthcare Discussed

Staff met with Brie Muhlenbruk, Community Outreach Representative from UnitedHealthcare. Staff educated Muhlenbruk on the I-Smile™ Silver Program, and how she could help find dental homes for the population that she serves: Medicare/Medicaid dual enrolled recipients. Ms. Muhlenbruk would like to set up a meeting with the area agents so that they can be educated on the resource available to them for oral health referrals.

#### Food Rescue Partnership Discusses Food Rescue with Genesis

Staff met with Genesis Health System representatives to discuss beginning food rescue efforts. Genesis reached out to the Food Rescue Partnership (FRP) after viewing the FRP's commercial on KWQC-TV6. Genesis staff expressed interest in piloting food rescue efforts at the Genesis East campus and requested the FRP provide sample liability waivers from other donors. Genesis was provided the food rescue resource kit, sample liability waivers, and a list of meal sites in the Quad Cities. Prior to moving forward with the food rescue pilot, Genesis staff will present the provided information to its legal and risk management department.

#### Be Health QC Coalition Updates on Workgroup Activities

The Be Healthy QC Coalition met to provide updates on various activities. The Worksite Wellness Workgroup shared that the 2019 Workplace Wellness Recognition Program Assessment was edited to reflect updates in the CDC's CHANGE tool. The program now includes two levels of recognition: a "Gold" recognition along with the standard recognition. This assessment will be rolled out in the spring.

A survey was also emailed to workplaces recognized previously to capture feedback on potential workplace wellness related programming. The survey respondents mentioned interest in resources as well as information sharing. The Workgroup created a list of resources regarding wellness and have posted it on the Quad City Health Initiative's (QCHI) website. Updates were also provided on the Built Environment and QCHI Promotion Committees. The Coalition members discussed opportunities and priorities for 2019 in order to develop goals.

#### Discussion of Partnership to Educate CNAs

Staff spoke with Annette Holst, Genesis Medical Center Nursing Professional Development Specialist, regarding educating their certified nursing assistants on oral/systemic health. Ms. Holst is interested in I-Smile™ Silver providing oral health education at the regular training meetings.

Quad Cities Public Information Group

Staff attended the Quad Cities Public Information Group (QC PIO) meeting during January. The QC PIO Group is a revitalized version of the Illinois Iowa Quad Cities Communication Network. The group seeks to enhance communication between organizations and the public in order to ensure a robust public communication system. The group has established objectives to engage a wide variety of communication professionals, facilitate public health plan updates, develop relationships, and improve communication skills through training. Staff has been asked to facilitate a Social Media Committee to determine best practices and strategies the group hopes to incorporate into its efforts.

Collaboration with Churches United on HIV/HCV Outreach

Staff met with Churches United of the Quad Cities Area (CUQCA) leadership to discuss implementation of outreach efforts discussed previously. CUQCA will share content in its newsletter, email blast, social media, and radio formats about SCHD HIV/HCV prevention and testing initiatives. Content will be developed and shared in February inviting local churches to participate in the National Week of Prayer for the Healing of HIV/AIDS Campaign and to contact SCHD outreach staff to include HIV prevention and testing services at any relevant health fairs or community events in the coming year.

Discussion of Animal Bite Reporting and Animal Quarantine with Kings Harvest Pet Rescue

Staff met with Kitty Schutts, Humane Society of Scott County Shelter Manager, Terri Gleize, Director, and Rochelle Dougal, Assistant Director of Kings Harvest Pet Rescue, to discuss animal bite reporting and animal quarantine requirements. The department will be working with both agencies to assure that any animals involved in a rabies risk exposure are properly quarantined.

Community Awareness of Roadway Safety

Staff attended the Community Awareness of Roadway Safety (CARS) meeting. This month's meeting was the annual bi-state collaboration set as a moment for regional sharing of information and activities. The group spent the majority of the meeting discussing the I-74 project and upcoming safety issues that should be expected as the project moves into the next phase. The group also discussed the current roadway fatality rate in Iowa and the efforts that have led it to be lower than typical around this time.
