## **Assessment**

*Assess and monitor population health status, factors that influence health, and community needs and assets*

### Community Health Improvement Plan Work Continues

Staff attended the Quad Cities Trauma Informed Consortium Steering Committee to gather feedback on the sections where the Trauma Informed Consortium was included on the previous Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). Consortium members shared current efforts to move towards implementation of trauma-informed care in organizations and workplaces. The group also provides several trainings, including Adverse Childhood Experiences and a Health Equity Speakers Bureau, to the community at no cost. Monthly meetings focus on specific topics from different presenters and are open to the public. Consortium members agreed that prevention, education, and outreach efforts written into the previous CHIP are still relevant and ongoing.

Staff met with Janet Hill, Rock Island County Health Department, to begin drafting the 2023-2026 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) for Scott and Rock Island counties. Staff have attended several meetings over the past few months with various community groups and coalitions to gather feedback on strategies from the previous CHIP that will be transitioned due to the pandemic, as well as new ideas to incorporate. The Health Departments plan to have a draft completed by the end of 2022 and will seek additional input from stakeholders before finalizing the plan in early 2023.

*Investigate, diagnose, and address health problems and hazards affecting the population*

### Communicable Disease Program

A total of 406 communicable diseases were reported during October. They included seven cases of hepatitis C, four cases of hepatitis B, three cases of campylobacteriosis, two cases of salmonellosis, and one e. Coli infection. In addition, there were 389 laboratory-confirmed cases of COVID-19 reported.

### Rabies Risk Assessments

In October, 38 individuals required rabies risk assessments after exposures to 24 dogs, 11 cats, and three bats. Eleven victims were recommended for rabies prevention treatment for a high-risk exposure or a bite above the shoulders and all started the treatment.

### Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program

In October, there were five children receiving individual case management. Of those, three had a blood level between 20-44 ug/dL and two had a level less than 15 ug/dL. There were no children that had a level between 15-19 ug/dL. These cases receive case management until they

meet closure criteria. Seven children with an initial blood lead level between 10-14 ug/dL received supportive services for lead poisoning during the month. Six children have a blood lead level between 10-14 ug/dL and one has a level less than 10 ug/dL. These children receive public health nursing support until two consecutive blood lead levels equal to or below 3.5 ug/dL are obtained. Seven children attending the department's immunization clinic accepted lead testing services during their October visit. There were no new positives identified during this effort.

### Sexual Health Program

Seventy-eight individuals received sexually transmitted infection (STI) clinic services during October 2022. Fifteen clients tested positive for chlamydia and seven clients tested positive for gonorrhea at the Health Department's clinic. In total, 81 cases of chlamydia, 33 cases of gonorrhea, and five cases of syphilis were reported in Scott County during October. An additional 21 syphilis cases were investigated and determined to be either out of jurisdiction, an old case, not identified as a syphilis case, or had a pending case status. These cases were closed or referred. Two HIV cases were investigated; one was a false positive result, and other case resides out of jurisdiction.

### **Policy Development**

*Communicate effectively to inform and educate people about health factors that influence it, and how to improve it*

### Tobacco and Nicotine Quit Materials and Education Shared

Staff provided Quitline Iowa program information and giveaways to Bettendorf Health Care. Bettendorf Health Care leadership is encouraging staff who use tobacco and nicotine products to quit and are sharing the Quitline Iowa information as a possible free cessation resource.

Staff provided prevention education focused on the risks of tobacco and nicotine use, especially vaping, to four students at the Safer Foundation. The group had also recently completed an Iowa Students for Tobacco Education and Prevention (ISTEP) activity where they tie dyed ISTEP t-shirts. Pictures from their activity were shared on Tobacco-Free QC (TFQC) social media. Students also heard about the importance of having an established medical, dental and vision care services. Lastly, a demonstration was completed on good hand hygiene.

Staff collaborated with Jason Otten, Prevention Specialist from the Center for Alcohol & Drug Services, Inc. (CADS), to offer prevention education at Pleasant Valley High School. Approximately 415 freshmen health students received education about the risks of tobacco and nicotine use, especially vaping, and played a Jeopardy style game that helped to reiterate the information shared in the educational presentation. Staff also discussed the free supportive resources available to young people in Iowa including My Life My Quit and Your Life Iowa to help with nicotine and other addictions, as well as mental health. Staff conducted a post-education survey with 309 of the 415 participants. The amount of students who perceived tobacco/vaping use to be high risk increased from 67 percent (n=207) before the prevention

education session to 79 percent (n=244) after. Additionally, 73 percent (n= 227) believed their knowledge increased because of the education.

Staff presented about nicotine use, especially vaping, to 16 nurses from the Davenport Community School District. The goal of the presentation was for nurses to learn more about:

- History of vaping products;
- Harmful ingredients in vaping devices;
- Negative health effects associated with vaping;
- How the tobacco industry targets youth in their marketing strategies;
- Signs that young people may be vaping;
- Free resources (i.e. prevention education from SCHED and CADS; Iowa Students for Tobacco Education and Prevention/ISTEP chapters; and cessation programs including Quitline Iowa and My Life My Quit) that can be shared with schools, students, and families.

#### Domestic Violence Event

Staff attended an event sponsored by Open Door on Taking A Stand Against Domestic Violence. The event focused on hearing voices from the African American community, which comprised of testimonies provided by those who celebrated their journey from victim to victory, abuser to advocate, as well as culturally sensitive mental, physical health, and personal care services. SCHED participated by displaying information on I-Smile™, Child and Adolescent Health, Black Doula, and HIV/Sexual Health programs.

*Strengthen, support, and mobilize communities, and partnerships to improve health*

#### Point Of Dispensing Locations Discussion with Scott County Emergency Management

Staff met with Jim Hawkes, Scott County Emergency Management Agency, to discuss potential Point of Dispensing (POD) locations. PODs are locations within the community where state and local agencies can dispense and administer medical countermeasures (vaccines, antiviral drugs, antibiotics, etc.) to the public in the event of an emergency. The group discussed potential locations for both open and closed PODs. An open POD is typically located at public locations and members of the public are able to receive services. A closed POD is one that is staffed and managed by organizations and agencies to provide medical countermeasures only to their own populations. During COVID, the Sears location was an example of an open POD and the clinic held at St. Ambrose University was a closed POD.

#### Oral Health Presentation for Veteran Organizations

Staff presented on oral health and its impact on overall health at the Iowa Veterans Trust Fund Commission meeting and the Veterans Service Officers Association meeting. These presentations were intended to build a stronger relationship to support care coordination efforts for veterans, to strengthen the understanding of the importance of oral health, and to explain the use of trust funds to help veterans' overall health.

Health and Wellness Education and Testing Provided at Community Organizations/Events

The HIV/Sexual Health outreach team sponsored and participated in the A System Within a System’s (ASWAS Inc.) second annual African-American Male Youth Summit. The event was held at St. Ambrose University. During the summit, the outreach team engaged the community with a wide range of health and wellness information, activities, and giveaways. The team also presented on Health and Wellness at the Scott County Youth Justice and Rehabilitation Center, Rosecrance New Life Mental Health and Substance Use treatment facility, and McKinley Elementary School. Ten events during the month included HIV testing; 109 tests were completed.

*Create, champion, and implement policies, plans, and laws that impact health*

Immunization Audits Continue

Immunization audits of the schools were finished in October ahead of the state’s due date. Results will be shared with the Board of Health once the child care center audits are completed. Those audits are due to the state by January 31, 2023. In preparation for the audits, staff continues to meet with childcare centers to review immunization records. During these visits, if the center has complete immunization records, the immunization audit form is completed.

State Meetings Share New Expectations for Programs

Staff attended the quarterly I-Smile™ coordinator meeting and learned of new consent form requirements as well as a needs assessment report. In addition, the state provided training materials for the dental direct services consultant position to be filled. The meeting also provided an opportunity for the department’s new community dental consultant to meet the other coordinators and state representatives.

Staff attended Fall Seminar meetings for the Child and Adolescent Health program and the Maternal Health (now called “Healthy Pregnancy”) program. State staff introduced new consultants, reviewed contract requirements, discussed the revised administrative manual, and encouraged grantees to share some of the action plans they will be implementing this year.

*Utilize legal and regulatory actions designed to improve and protect the public’s health*

Notice of Potential Violation

Staff received one notice of potential violation (NOPV) for the Smoke Free Air Act during October. The notice was sent to Quad City Testing Laboratory located at 21112 Scott Park Road in Davenport, Iowa. At this time, there has been no request for education or additional information by the establishment. This is the first NOPV for this establishment in the last 12 months.

#### Hotel Inspections and Complaint Follow-up

Staff continued to conduct inspections of Wood Spring Suites due to the presence of cockroaches in several rooms. Orkin has continued to service this facility and the situation has improved. Staff will receive ongoing updates from Orkin regarding the facility. Staff responded to several other hotel complaints. Upon investigation, the complaints were unverifiable; routine inspections of these hotels were conducted at the time of the complaint investigations.

#### **Assurance**

*Assure an effective system that enables access to the individual services and care needed to be healthy*

#### Services Begin for Collaborative Service Area

Staff began providing Child and Adolescent Health Informing Services for the full Collaborative Service Area: Cedar, Clinton, Jackson, and Scott Counties. In the first month, the number of families to contact increased by about 40 percent with the addition of the three other counties.

Staff completed outreach for Hawki and I-Smile™ programs at 14 dental and medical providers as well as schools and pre-school settings. During outreach, information was shared about Hawki services and the I-Smile™ program, questions were answered, and brochures and promotional items were distributed.

Staff traveled to WIC clinics in the cities of Tipton and Clinton offering Healthy Pregnancy (Maternal Health) services and oral health services to clients. Earlier in the month, staff traveled to the Hillcrest WIC clinic in Clinton to meet their staff, learn about local resources, discuss clinic flow, and see the space available for staff to provide services.

### First Med Pharmacy Review

In September, 214 inmates received 822 prescriptions. During the month, 98.5 percent of medical and 99.5 percent of mental health medications were generic.

### Non-Public School Students Connected to Immunization Resources

Staff has continued to follow up on the immunization records for 65 students in the non-public schools who were not up-to-date on their immunizations as identified during the immunization audit process. Parents have been notified and resources have been provided to assist them in getting their students vaccinated.

### Developmental Screening Provide

Staff completed developmental screenings for children using Ages & Stages Questionnaires® (ASQ-3). This screening tool is designed to assist with the developmental monitoring of infants and young children during the crucial first five years of life. The questionnaire items include activities that are fun and attractive to children and allows them to engage in toys and other materials to encourage participation. The assessment looks at five critical skill areas of communication, gross motor, fine motor, problem solving, and personal-social.

### Vaccines Provided

Staff offered free influenza and Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, and acellular pertussis) vaccine to childcare providers. Childcare centers with 7 or more staff wanting vaccine can schedule an onsite clinic, or providers can schedule an appointment at the Health Department. Eight centers held onsite vaccine clinics for staff and one home provider visited SCHD during October; 103 influenza vaccines were given. Scott County Kids Early Childhood Iowa funds influenza and Tdap vaccines.

Staff conducted a small vaccine clinic at Rivermont Collegiate non-public school. This unique situation arose when staff audited the school's immunization records and found many international students whose vaccination records did not comply with Iowa law. Although each of the students had received many vaccinations in their home country, Iowa vaccination requirements are different and many of the vaccines that Iowa requires are not available in their home countries. According to Iowa law, the students were to be excluded until the proper vaccines were received. Transportation and clinic conflicts compounded the situation and it would have taken several weeks to schedule the students into clinic, thus disrupting their learning by not being in school. At the clinic, 73 vaccinations were given to 25 international students and all the students were able to remain in school without interruption. Any follow-up vaccines will be provided at the Health Department.

While COVID-19 bivalent boosters remain available at the department on a walk-in basis, in an effort to encourage Scott County and City of Davenport employees to get boosted, the department hosted an employee clinic; 68 individuals received their booster during the day.

### Efforts to Increase Oral Health Care

Staff has been invited to take part in a focused oral health stakeholder workgroup. The primary goal is to find strategic ways Medicaid members can be referred in a timely for oral health care in emergent and non-emergent situations.

Staff received five new oral health referrals for veterans and have found four new dental offices who will work with the Iowa Veterans Trust Fund for payment of dental care.

*Build and support a diverse and skilled public health workforce*

### Leadership Training

Various staff participated in the Leadership Movie Club focused on *The King's Speech*. The day was facilitated by Chris Battell and Donna Honald. During Movie Club, participants discussed various leadership principles and discussed how those principles relate to the county PRIDE statement. Attendees were also able to meet other leaders throughout Scott County.

Scott County Human Resources held a two-day Leadership Summit. This was the first Leadership Summit in several years. Three of the department's managers attended the event and will continue with learning throughout the year. As a part of the process, a 360° evaluation is completed by manager, peers, colleagues, and staff prior to the event. Time is spent talking through this feedback with peers and facilitators.

### Preparedness Trainings Provide Insight into Community Emergency Planning and Response

Staff attended the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) training, *Preparedness – MGT 403: Access and Functional Needs Preparedness Planning for Rural Communities*. The goal of this course was to increase knowledge among community emergency planners in the area of pre-planning and preparedness, especially focusing on ensuring the safety of older adults, particularly those living in assisted-living and nursing homes, and people with access and functional needs during a crisis event. A whole community outreach effort is encouraged to ensure that everyone is aware that individuals may require personalized care, transportation, shelter, and medical assistance. Preparedness staff must consider these needs before a crisis occurs. Staff completed a preparedness and response tabletop activity that examined the impact of a flood on a community, especially for residents of an assisted living.

Staff attended the two-day FEMA training, *MGT:341 - Disaster Preparedness for Healthcare Organizations*. Attendees learned the importance of conducting internal assessments, reviewing disaster plans, and testing those disaster plans through tabletop exercises, functional exercises, and full-scale exercises. Participants also received many resources on Hazard Vulnerability Assessments.

### Advanced Epidemiology Training

Several staff attended the training *Advanced Epidemiology: Introduction to Disease Investigations & Outbreaks* hosted by the State of Iowa Department of Health and Human Services and presented by Diana Von Stein, Regional Epidemiologist. The training reviewed



basic epidemiology principles, discussed the role of local public health partners, discussed when individuals with enteric illnesses must be excluded from various settings/activities, provided an overview of a variety of testing terms and requirements, and reviewed outbreak investigations. The training is required for staff involved in communicable disease follow-up every three to four years, depending upon how often they complete the work (less diseases = more frequent training).

#### Iowa Environmental Health Association Fall Conference and Pre-Conference Work Day

Staff attended a State of Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals (DIA) Food Contract work day in Ankeny on the day prior to the Iowa Environmental Health Association's Fall Conference. Mike Nordos, FDA Retail Food Specialist, spoke about the Voluntary National Retail Food Regulatory Program Standards changes in 2022. Merri Cross and Julie Kraling from the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals discussed the Absorb training database and the Home Food Processing Establishment Law respectively. Dennis Kuntz and Rodney Regenitter from the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship discussed meat inspection rules.

Several staff attended the Iowa Environmental Health Association's (IEHA) Fall Conference with two staff presenting. One staff person is a member of the IEHA Membership and Marketing Committee. This committee presented on the benefits of being an IEHA member. The other staff presenter has been participating in an Association of Food and Drug Officials fellowship program and presented on the data gathered throughout the project completed based upon emergency preparedness of food establishments in Scott County. Discussion followed the presentation regarding emergency preparedness and its impact on food safety.

Staff attended the session *Investigating Foodborne Illness In Iowa* presented by Thao Schlichte with DIA and Kemi Oni with the State of Iowa Department of Health and Human Services. The session focused the frequency of foodborne illness in Iowa and its most common causation. Attendees learned about the process DIA uses when a foodborne illness complaint is submitted. We also looked at actual cases that we recently covered in Iowa.

Staff attended a session on carbon sequestration in Iowa. There is a pipeline carrying carbon from North Dakota to Decatur, Illinois is proposed to cross northern Scott County. The speaker discussed geology, potential for carbon storage in the ground in Iowa, and the pipeline that will cross the State of Iowa.

Staff attended the session, *An Exercise in Active Managerial Control*, facilitated by the Black Hawk County Health Department. Environmental health staff from Black Hawk County discussed the project design and implementation of an active managerial control (AMC) program that provided managers, supervisors, and persons-in-charge with the tools and knowledge to become active managers in their establishments. Black Hawk County staff shared the measures that they used, the strengths of their project, and opportunities for improvement. Staff also discussed the impact that the Covid-19 pandemic had on their project.

Staff attended sessions presented by Vildana Tinjic from Linn County Public Health and Jodi Zimmerman from El Paso County Public Health about the industry of body art and modification. Issues covered were future legislative priorities regarding the regulation of the pigments that go into the ink used and an introduction to the various body modification techniques that are becoming more popularized, but are still not well understood by the regulatory community. *Improve and innovate public health functions through ongoing evaluation, research, and continuous quality improvement*

#### After Action Review Conducted on Farmer's Market Sampling

In August, staff accompanied inspectors from the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals (DIA) to the Freight House Farmer's Market in August. The Iowa Department of Public Health and DIA were investigating an outbreak of salmonellosis with the potential common source of melons purchased from farmer's markets and roadside stands. Department staff gathered considerable information from the Freight House Farmer's Market organizer in order to facilitate an efficient process to collect the samples for analysis. As part of the state's follow-up efforts, after action reviews are conducted to identify areas of strength and areas for improvement.

#### Community-Based Screening Services Third Quarter Data Report

The Sexual Health Program received the Community-Based Screening Services (CBSS) Third Quarter 2022 Data and Quality Assurance Reports. The 2022 third quarter chlamydia and gonorrhea positivity rates for CBSS sites were 7.6 percent and 3.6 percent, respectively. Fifty-three percent of positive chlamydia tests were female and 60 percent of positive tests were identified in individuals 24 years of age or younger. For gonorrhea, 62.8 percent of positive tests were male, with 37.1 percent of positive tests identified in individuals 24 years of age or younger. The highest positive rates by age for chlamydia was in the 15 to 19 years population. The highest positivity rates by age for gonorrhea was in individuals 30 years and older.

#### Quad Cities Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Facilities Tabletop Exercise

Staff participated in a Quad Cities Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Facilities tabletop exercise. Scott County Health Department's role in the exercise was to be stationed at the Simulation Cell at the Scott County Emergency Communications Center in case an exercise participant needed to call for Health Department information or input. There were approximately 28 participants from various CMS facilities in the county that participated.

*Build and maintain a strong organization infrastructure for public health*

#### Department Infrastructure Teams

##### *Quality Improvement Council*

The Quality Improvement Council met to tally the results of the recent Leadership and Staff Culture of Quality Roadmap Assessment. The Council Members reviewed the results and identified areas that may be included in the current fiscal year work plan. Discussion will continue in November.

*Health Equity Committee*

The Health Equity Committee is updating the department's Health Equity Plan, including finalizing the framework the committee will use to address health equity as a department: understanding health inequities through staff assessment; staff training; and addressing health equity in program, policy, and strategy development. The committee is identifying tools for use for an internal health equity assessment. The Bay Area Regional Health Initiative (BARHII) assessment tool is the leading framework for internal assessments. Hennepin County, MN has created an abbreviated version of the tool. The team has reached out to Hennepin County to start a conversation about their version of the tool and how this may benefit the department's equity efforts. The committee continues to work through the FY23 annual workplan, which includes an activity to identify health equity projects within the department to undertake within the next 9 months. Suggestions have been made to survey staff for ideas. This will take place before the end of the year.

*Legislative Committee*

The Legislative Committee discussed the initial phase of its plan to connect with elected officials. In October, all elected officials and candidates for the state legislature and Scott County Board of Supervisors were sent an electronic copy of the department's FY22 Annual Report with a brief introduction. Following the election, each of the elected officials will be mailed a personalized note with a copy of the department's brochure and an insert with information on how to access SCHD's website and social media. The note will include our willingness to be a resource to them in their work as well as contact information. The group also brainstormed other communication tools.

In addition, the committee discussed how to handle legislative priorities that come from the Iowa Public Health Association, Iowa Environmental Health Association, and the Iowa State Association of Counties. The plan is that as these policy agendas/priorities are received, they will be shared with the Board of Health (BOH) to review and discuss. The BOH can then choose to direct the department to develop policy statements in alignment with identified priorities.

*Workforce Development Committee*

The Workforce Development Committee discussed its plans for promoting, tracking, and celebrating the completion of the Workforce Development Survey to be launched in January 2023. The Committee also reviewed the questions updating language, including questions on demographics to allow for self-reporting to guide the workplace profile, including current developments in public health, and including a question on barriers to training. The University of Iowa College of Public Health will be assisting with the survey.

*Workplace Culture Committee*

The Workplace Culture Committee continued discussion around the National Association of County and City Health Officials' Joy in Work Toolkit. The primary authors were associated with the Adaptive Leadership Academy, and will be contacted to determine if there are ways to connect with other departments beginning to implement the toolkit.

*Health Promotion Team*

The Health Promotion Team continues to work on promoting COVID messages throughout Scott County. Messages in both English and Spanish were developed through OnMedia, and radio ads were approved for use on FM 92.5. The bus ads that are currently in place on the interior and exterior of Citibus as well as bus shelters were extended through February. The team drafted the 2023 work plan, and has assigned the Health Promotion Strategy of National Infant Immunization Week.
