## **Assessment**

*Assess and monitor population health status, factors that influence health, and community needs and assets*

### Community Health Assessment Stakeholder Committee Approves CHIP

Staff met with the Stakeholder Committee to review the 2023-2026 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). Staff provided an overview of the CHIP process and what had occurred since the last meeting. Staff summarized broad themes for each priority area and highlighted changes made based off input provided by the Stakeholder Committee and other community partners. Committee members provided feedback on the plan via Mentimeter, including responses to what challenges may be encountered during implementation of the plan, and what this plan will mean for the health of the community. Staff shared a timeline for implementation and evaluation and encouraged committee members to get involved with the next steps of the CHIP process.

*Investigate, diagnose, and address health problems and hazards affecting the population*

### Communicable Disease Program

A total of 300 communicable diseases were reported during February. They included three cases of hepatitis C and one case of cryptosporidiosis. In addition, there were 296 laboratory-confirmed cases of COVID-19 reported.

As was shared previously, March 31, 2023 will be the last day in Iowa that COVID-19 positive results are required to be reported by health care providers and laboratories in Iowa. At that time, illness data regarding COVID-19 will transition to a surveillance model. At that time the department will no longer have access to the DOMO system which has been used to track and report case information. Information will be saved from the system so that the department has it for historic perspectives. As of March 22, 2023, there have been 56,426 positive tests in Scott County and 450 deaths. While the end of this “phase” of COVID-19 changes some aspects of operations, the department will continue to be involved in vaccine efforts for the foreseeable future. Initial reports from the state is that vaccine will not be available for private purchase until later this calendar year.

### Rabies Risk Assessments

In February, 36 individuals required rabies risk assessments after exposures to 16 dogs, 17 cats,

one bat, one raccoon, and one rat. Five victims were recommended for rabies prevention treatment for a high-risk exposure or a bite above the shoulders and eight started the treatment; three individuals chose to seek the rabies post-exposure prophylaxis although they were not recommended to receive it.

#### Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program

In February, there were seven children receiving individual case management. Of those, one had a blood level between 20-44 ug/dL, one had a blood lead level between 15-19 ug/dL, and five had a blood lead level less than 15 ug/dL. These cases receive case management until they meet closure criteria. Six children with an initial blood lead level between 10-14 ug/dL received supportive services for lead poisoning during the month. Two children have a blood lead level between 10-14 ug/dL and four have levels less than 10 ug/dL. These children receive public health nursing support until two consecutive blood lead levels equal to or below 3.5 ug/dL are obtained. One child attending the department's immunization clinic received lead testing services during their February visit and two children were tested at WIC. There were no new positives identified during these efforts.

#### Sexual Health Program

Sixty-four individuals received sexually transmitted infection (STI) clinic services during February. Six clients tested positive for chlamydia, seven clients tested positive for gonorrhea, and one client tested positive for *Mycoplasma genitalium* at the Health Department's clinic. In total, 57 cases of chlamydia, 32 cases of gonorrhea, and four cases of syphilis were reported in Scott County during the month. An additional 17 syphilis cases were investigated and determined to be either out of jurisdiction, not identified as a syphilis case, or had a pending case status. These cases were closed or referred. One HIV case was investigated; it turned out to be a false-positive result.

#### **Policy Development**

*Communicate effectively to inform and educate people about health factors that influence it, and how to improve it*

#### Food Waste Presentation

Staff presented on behalf of the Food Rescue Partnership to a fourth-grade class at Forest Grove Elementary School. The class is working on a project to research and understand the impacts of food waste and food insecurity at a global and local level.

#### Black Maternal Health Facilitated Discussion

Staff facilitated a discussion at St. Ambrose University about black maternal health. The Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Office showed the documentary, *Aftershock*, that highlighted the history of black doula and midwifery care and present day issues that people are facing when it comes to maternal mortality. The discussion allowed for students to gain a deep understanding of this topic and how to integrate best practices within their areas of focus.

#### Kindergarten and Pre-School Round-Up Sessions

Staff attended kindergarten and pre-school round-up sessions at All Saints Catholic School, St. Paul the Apostle Catholic School, and JFK Catholic School. Parents were provided information on health requirements for enrolling in school, including immunizations, dental screening, vision screening, and lead testing. Education was also offered for parents enrolling students in school who have special health conditions.

#### Health and Wellness Presentations

Staff facilitated a Health and Wellness presentation to the students at Mid-City High School. The interactive multi-media presentation focuses on giving youth the tools necessary to be proactive about their health, encourages them to make good decisions and to live healthy lives. Four additional Health and Wellness presentations were provided: two to Iowa Jobs for America's Graduates (iJag) classes at Central High School and two at Rosecrance Center for New Life.

#### Information shared at St. Anthony's

Staff has partnered with volunteers at St. Anthony Catholic Church to provide Hawki information and education, as well as resources/services, to special populations groups connected to the church. St. Anthony's offers a lot of programming through its efforts to make a social impact.

*Strengthen, support, and mobilize communities, and partnerships to improve health*

#### Local Care for Yourself and WISEWOMAN Contractor Meeting

Staff met with Diane Koster and Tara Erpelding from the Genesis Cancer Center to discuss the Care For Yourself and WISEWOMAN grant requirements. Ms. Koster is the program coordinator for the Care for Yourself and WISEWOMAN programs at Genesis and Ms. Erpelding was recently promoted to the Director of Oncology.

#### Tobacco-Free QC Coalition

Staff co-facilitated the Tobacco-Free QC (TFQC) full coalition meeting. Members reviewed current activities within TFQC and discussed information needed as the group looks to rebrand its logo.

#### Low Birth Weight Workgroup

Staff attended the Low Birth Weight Workgroup meeting where members discussed finalizing the presentation that will be used to educate and receive feedback from the community. The group talked about doing a meet and greet with Augustana students, since they will be helping with gathering data, recording stories, and social media marketing. Department staff gave a report about the Healthy Pregnancy Coalition that will be established for Collaborative Service Area 14 (Cedar, Clinton, Jackson, and Scott Counties) and what to expect at the interest meeting.

#### Meeting on Vaping and Tobacco Use in Schools

Staff collaborated with Terry Hanson from Scott County Kids to meet with all area school resource officers and administration to discuss vaping and tobacco use in schools. These meetings were very well attended. Staff has been asked to assist in the formation of multiple Iowa Students for Tobacco Education and Prevention (ISTEP) chapters and to do several presentations at all schools.

#### Davenport Future Fest

Staff was on the planning committee and attended the Davenport Future Fest held at Mid-City High school to provide education and assistance to teens transitioning out of foster care. The attendance was not what the planning committee had hoped due to a variety of reasons including weather. The planning committee is exploring other ways to share the information.

#### Community Baby Shower Event Planning Underway

Staff met with Terry Hanson, Scott County Kids, to discuss the annual community baby shower event to be held this summer. This event provides diapers, supplies, and information on community resources to families in need.

#### Presentations to Collaborative Service Area 14 Partners

Staff and I attended the Clinton County Board of Health meeting and staff gave updates regarding Child and Adolescent Health, Maternal Health, and the I-Smile™ program in the county. Staff and I also attended the Clinton-Jackson County Early Childhood Iowa (ECI) Board meeting. Staff gave an orientation to the I-Smile™ program and discussed activities that were underway through the Clinton-Jackson ECI contract.

#### National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day Event

In collaboration with the Davenport Chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), A System Within A System (ASWAS), Inc., and Medicine in The Barbershop, staff coordinated a mobile testing clinic in celebration of National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day (NBHAAD). The testing event highlighted the progress of HIV testing, prevention, treatment efforts, and spoke to the ongoing challenges to reducing HIV within the Black community. In addition to testing, an introduction to NBHAAD was streamed to community members in Ohio and Michigan.

#### Partnership Sought with LULAC

Staff attended the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) Community Meeting to share information on the Family Health Program. Community engagement is a priority of the program work and staff inquired regarding how to best connect with Hispanic and Latino families who would be interested in meeting with the department's family health coordinators to share their experiences with obtaining medical, dental, and vision care providers, as well as brainstorm ways to get more children lead tested.

### The Systems Series

Staff was invited to take part in the ASWAS Inc., “The Systems Series” held at Central High School. The System Series offers a unique opportunity to meet, speak to, and hear from professionals that work in the fields of real estate, financial literacy, health and wellness, economics, education and/or the judicial system.

### Jail Advisory Committee

For the first time since November 2019, the Jail Advisory Committee convened. This Committee brings together a number of Scott County departments and contractors to discuss operations and inmate care. These meetings will occur quarterly. One change that occurred following the meeting is that a corrections officer is assigned twice a week for several hours to help facilitate the completion of health appraisals. As has been shared in the department performance measures, it has been a challenge to maintain high levels of health appraisals due to a variety of factors. This partnership and support is anticipated to improve those numbers.

*Create, champion, and implement policies, plans, and laws that impact health*

### CHANGE Tool Discussion with City of LeClaire

Staff met with Greg Ludwig, Parks and Recreation Director for the City of LeClaire, to continue discussions on the Community Health Assessment and Group Evaluation (CHANGE) Tool recommendations. The LeClaire City Council denied the Park Board’s request to adopt a tobacco and nicotine free resolution or ordinance. Staff will continue to work with the City’s Park Board to discuss other recommendations such as:

- Adopting a comprehensive sidewalk policy;
- Requiring sidewalks to be built for all developments;
- Supporting farmers’ markets;
- Adopting a resolution to support and protect a lactating person’s right to breastfeed/chestfeed in public places;
- Encouraging community garden initiatives; and
- Providing Hands-Only CPR training to community members.

### Preliminary Discussion with City of Bettendorf Regarding Tobacco and Nicotine Free Ordinance

Staff met with Kim Kidwell, Director of Culture and Recreation for the City of Bettendorf to discuss the logistics of adopting a Tobacco Free/Nicotine Free city ordinance that would include vaping products. Ms. Kidwell would like staff to present this information at a city council meeting. An exception may be necessary to not include golf courses.

#### **Assurance**

*Assure an effective system that enables access to the individual services and care needed to be healthy*

#### Event to Support Homeless Veterans

Staff participated in the Stand Down for Homeless Veterans event. Stand Down is held twice yearly to support area veterans experiencing homelessness. At the event, staff offered HIV/hepatitis C (HCV) testing, COVID-19 and influenza vaccines, as well as information about I-Smile™ Silver and smoking cessation.

#### HIV and Hepatitis C Testing

Staff offered HIV/HCV testing at two mobile testing sites in Muscatine County. Community members at both Pearl City Outreach and Muscatine Center for Social Action received HIV/HCV screening, harm reduction supplies, and social services referrals. To strengthen community partnerships and outreach initiatives, the mobile testing at Muscatine Center for Social Action was attended by Joaquin Bueno Diaz, the Prevention Manager of The Project of The Quad Cities (TPQC). There is ongoing conversations regarding how the department and TPQC can partner in providing status awareness in Scott and Muscatine County.

#### Non-Public School Screenings Completed

Staff completed health screenings at the last three non-public schools in February. Health screening totals this year included 98 kindergarten dental screenings, 855 vision screenings, and eight kindergarten hearing screenings. Twelve students were referred for dental

evaluations (three serious concerns), 64 students were referred for vision evaluations (five serious concerns), and one student was referred for a hearing evaluation follow up.

#### Family Health Services

Maternal Health nurses have started providing direct care to pregnant and postpartum clients in the community at CHC River Drive, CHC Edgerton, The Group, and Tipton WIC. Dental staff started going to childcare centers and schools to provide screenings and fluoride treatments. In February, staff visited five child care centers, four in Davenport and one in Tipton, and one school in Clinton. The department's child care nurse consultant (CCNC) met with a child development home provider to provide education and support as she plans to care for a child with allergies and anaphylaxis.

#### I-Smile™ Silver Screening Services

Staff continues to provide oral health screening services at Genesis Health Group on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street in Davenport once a week. This project helps link individuals with chronic health needs to oral health care. Staff continues to provide oral health screening services at the Center for Active Seniors Inc. on the third Friday of each month.

#### *Build and support a diverse and skilled public health workforce*

#### Webinar Regarding Supporting Children with Special Health Needs

Staff participated in the webinar, *Caring for Children with Special Health Needs*, presented by Head Start. Approximately 14.1 million children in the United States have a special health care need and one in four households have one or more children with a special health need. The webinar described different strategies a CCNC can use to support staff and families in caring for children with special health needs, including communication plans and staff training.

#### Association of Food and Drug Officials Training

Food program staff all participated virtually in the Association of Food and Drug Officials (AFDO) Advanced Inspector Bootcamp Training. This course built on the Inspector Bootcamp Training each food inspector participated in last year. Topics for this course included food safety culture, inspection techniques and dialogue, foodborne illness outbreaks, personal mindset success, and hazard analysis and critical control points (HACCP) plans.

#### Family Health Trained in Listening Visits

Family Health staff attended Listening Visit Training provided by the Iowa Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). Staff will now be able to provide Healthy Pregnancy clients with listening visits to fill the gap for clients who need mental health assistance and someone to listen while they are waiting for an appointment with a mental health professional.

#### Septic Tank Program Lunch and Learn

Staff attended a virtual lunch and learn through Des Moines Area Community College. Information was shared regarding septic tanks and investigations, septic system malfunctions, and drain fields and associated investigations.



#### School-Based Dental Sealant Webinar

Staff participated in a webinar about a school-based dental sealant program based in Texas. The successful program discussed general information about the program such as consent forms, targeted populations, service settings, and staffing.

#### New Inspector Training

Staff attended the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals (DIA) new inspector training. This virtual training is held for employees new to the DIA food program and is designed to prepare inspectors with the resources and knowledge to perform food inspections. The topics and activities included food code overview, report writing, HACCP principles, complaint investigations, licensing, and inspections.

#### Cross Service Training on Lead

Clinical Services and Environmental Health staff presented education to the Family Health service area on lead poisoning. The group was educated on the effects of lead poisoning on a child's growth and development and ways to help eliminate lead from their bodies through proper nutrition and regular medical care. Staff explained how lead investigations are conducted and ways to help reduce or eliminate lead hazards in the environment. Family Health has a role in supporting childhood lead testing through the Child and Adolescent Health contract.

#### Advanced Incident Command Training

A number of staff completed *ICS-400, Advanced Incident Command System (ICS) for Complex Incidents*. This two-day course was hosted by the Scott County Emergency Management Agency. ICS-400 is designed for those emergency response personnel who would function as part of an area command, emergency operations center, or multiagency coordination system during a large, complex incident or event, or personnel who are or would likely be part of a local or regional incident management team during a major incident, whether single agency, multiagency, or unified command. The training involved both lecture and simulation - based learning opportunities.

*Improve and innovate public health functions through ongoing evaluation, research, and continuous quality improvement*

#### Project Public Health Ready Gap Analysis Tool

Using the Project Public Health Ready (PPHR) Gap Analysis Tool, staff has been reviewing the Scott County All Hazards Plan to determine if the plan meets a number of standards. The tool will help the team identify what is missing from the plan and make improvements. This tool will also be valuable as the plan is updated as required for Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) reaccreditation.

#### Scott County Kids Site Visit

Staff and I met with Diane Martens from Scott County Kids for the annual CCNC contract review site visit. No concerns were noted.

### Maternal Health Chart Audit

The Maternal Health team completed an internal chart audit on Maternal Health direct care records. Findings were largely positive. Areas for improvement identified remembering to complete all fields, offering education on seatbelt use, documenting the reason for using phone rather than video for telehealth, and double-checking forms for signatures.

### Scott County Information Technology Plan

Several staff as well as the department's leadership team participated in the Scott County Information Technology's Technology Assessment discussion facilitated by Crowe Consulting. Attendees were asked to provide feedback reflecting strengths, challenges, and barriers experienced when using technology in daily work. In addition, attendees had the opportunity to identify areas where changes could support department technology needs.

### Maternal Health Contractor's Meeting

Staff attended virtual meetings with Iowa HHS consultants for the Maternal Health Monthly Contractor's meeting and the Iowa Black Doula project. Program updates from the state were received, and grantees had the opportunity to talk and share best practices.

*Build and maintain a strong organization infrastructure for public health*

### Budget Adjustments

Due to legislation passed making adjustments to the property-tax rollback, Scott County's proposed fiscal year 24 budget was out of balance by \$1.6 million dollars. All departments were requested to look at their budgets to determine whether there were areas where revenue could increase or expenditures could decrease. Those ideas were shared with Scott County Administration and the Board of Supervisors for review. The Health Department's budget will decrease approximately \$200,000 compared to what was approved by the Board of Health (BOH) in December. No significant program impacts are anticipated.

### Department Infrastructure Teams

#### *Quality Improvement Council*

The Quality Improvement (QI) Council facilitated a consensus workshop at February's All-Staff meeting. The focus question was, "What are some ways that the department fridge can be kept clean and accessible for all?" The rational aim (what the group wanted to accomplish) was to have a set of guidelines for keeping the fridge clean and accessible. The experiential aim (what the group was to experience) was shared decision making as a department using a QI tool. The QI Council is hopeful that working through the process will both improve staff experience when using the fridge, will help encourage staff to share QI project ideas with the council, and will help staff to feel more comfortable with the idea of using QI tools.

#### *Health Equity Committee*

The Health Equity Committee is making progress on recommending "Health Equity in Action" projects to promote equity in department programs, services, and location. The committee is

revising a final draft of the Health Equity Plan. In addition, parallel discussions have taken place on identifying a health equity assessment tool to gauge and monitor the department's efforts to promote equity.

#### *Legislative Committee*

The Legislative Committee reviewed updates suggested by the BOH regarding the Mandatory Child Care and School Immunization Requirements. The committee also discussed drafting a statement on e-cigarette use for BOH review as well as other core public health functions such as tools to prevent disease spread in the future.

#### *Workforce Development Committee*

The Workforce Development Committee reviewed a preliminary report of the findings from the 2023 Workforce Development Assessment; a full report is expected by the end of March. The committee also spent time discussing New Employee Orientation. The department's process is in need of updating and the committee will be working through this process. The goal is to expand the orientation process in an effort to make it less about getting a checklist done, and more about getting a solid foundation of public health and the department.

#### *Workplace Culture Committee*

Members of the Workplace Culture Committee listened to the second of the National Association of County and City Officials' (NACCHO) Joy in Work Toolkit webinars. This webinar focused on designing and holding "What Matters to You" conversations. NACCHO is continuing to develop resources to support this toolkit. In addition, the Committee finalized an August date to hold a department-wide training event.

#### *Health Promotion Team*

The Health Promotion Team convened a team to work on a Health Promotion Strategy for National Infant Immunization Week (NIIW), which takes place April 24 to May 1, 2023. This is a national observance to promote the benefits of vaccine and health improvements for children ages two and younger. The team's strategy seeks to improve public opinion and increase knowledge of vaccine benefits to encourage timely immunizations. The two target populations chosen include 1) families and community members; and 2) special priority population groups (those that are considered vulnerable or have social disparities). The strategy will involve posters for display at department immunization clinics; posters offered to partners at WIC, LULAC, Quad City Pediatrics, Genesis, and UnityPoint; mailing flyer to clients under two years of age that are on the Scott County informing list; sharing information with families at WIC clinics via Maternal Health staff; sharing information with families at the department's immunization clinics; scheduling a series of social media posts; publishing an article in the Public Health Connection regarding NIIW; and publishing information in church bulletins. Team members plan to ask families attending the department's immunization clinics, Community Health Care Inc's WIC clinics, and LULAC clients to evaluate posters created prior to NIIW and their feedback will be incorporated into the final product.

The Health Promotion Team has arranged for two billboards to be displayed in Davenport to promote the COVID vaccine and has completed a draft of the Health Promotion Plan. Staff has conducted an inventory of the department's promotional items and will conduct a survey with staff in the Spring to find out what promotional items may be needed in the upcoming year.
