Assessment

Assess and monitor population health status, factors that influence health, and community needs and assets

Information Gathered for 2025 CHIP and Planning for 2027 CHA Begins

Staff met with community partners, including the Community Health Assessment (CHA) Steering Committee and members of the CHA Stakeholder Committee, to gather updates for the 2025 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) Progress Report. Staff collected narratives and data points to show progress made on the strategies and activities of the CHIP priority areas, including mental health and access to care. Once finalized, the progress report will be shared back out with community partners and posted on the department’s website. The CHA Steering Committee also started discussing a general timeline for beginning the planning phase for the 2027 CHA. The group agreed to start meeting more frequently starting in late August to discuss the survey methodology.

Iowa Academy of Science Discusses Joint CHA Questions

Staff attended the Iowa Academy of Science (AoS) chapter meeting. This group has been working on creating a set of standardized questions for each county to include in their CHA. The next step includes having local health departments ask their local health assessment partners to review the questions and provide feedback before the questions are finalized.

Investigate, diagnose, and address health problems and hazards affecting the population

Communicable Disease Program

Seven confirmed communicable diseases were reported during February. They included one case of campylobacteriosis, one E. coli infection, one case of hepatitis E, one case of pertussis, and three cases of salmonellosis.

Animal Bite Program

In February, 13 individuals required rabies risk assessments after exposure to 10 dogs, two cats, and one bat. Eleven victims were recommended for rabies prevention treatment for a high-risk exposure or bite above the shoulders, and three victims started treatment.

Sexually Transmitted Disease Program

Forty-six individuals received sexual health services at the department during February. Two clients tested positive for chlamydia at the department’s sexual health clinic. An additional three clients tested positive for chlamydia and one client tested positive for gonorrhea in the department’s express clinic. In total, 47 cases of chlamydia, 16 cases of gonorrhea, and two

cases of syphilis were reported in Scott County during the month. There were 18 additional syphilis cases investigated and determined to be out of jurisdiction, not identified as a case, or had a pending result. These cases were closed, referred, or remained open pending additional results.

Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program

In February, there were 12 lead poisoned children on the department's caseload. Three cases met closure criteria. The remaining nine children will continue to receive public health nursing services until two consecutive blood lead levels equal to or below 10 ug/dL are obtained. Of these nine children, two had a blood lead level greater than 20 ug/dL, six had blood lead levels between 10-14 ug/dL, and one had blood a lead level less than 10 ug/dL.

Two children utilizing the department's immunization clinic accepted lead testing services at their February appointment; testing did not result in identification of lead poisoning.

Staff conducted an initial lead inspection at a Davenport property associated with a child with an elevated blood lead level. The inspection revealed the presence of loose, chipped, or cracked paint with a high content of lead on surfaces located on both the interior and exterior of the property. This is an owner-occupied unit, and the owners have completed a Live Lead-Free QC application to apply for financial assistance with lead remediation.

Staff conducted an initial lead inspection at rental duplex in Davenport associated with a child with an elevated blood lead level. The inspection revealed the presence of loose, chipped, or cracked paint with a high content of lead on surfaces located on both the interior and exterior of the property. The tenants and property owners have been informed of the lead-based paint hazards that exist at the property. The property owners plan to complete an upcoming Lead Safe Renovator course to become certified to complete the property's lead remediation work.

Staff also conducted a dust wipe clearance inspection on the interior of the property previously associated with a child with an elevated blood lead level. The interior lead remediation work has been completed and the Lead Safe Renovator contractor reached out to schedule the clearance inspection. Unfortunately, the results indicated that the property did not pass clearance. The contractor will need to do additional cleaning or modifications to ensure the results pass. This situation happens routinely.

The department's child care nurse consultant met with a child development home provider to share information and resources on lead poisoning and prevention. The home was recently discovered to have lead paint in areas used for child care during a child's lead poisoning case investigation. The provider has made the areas inaccessible to children and plans to remediate the areas.

Policy Development

Communicate effectively to inform and educate people about health factors that influence it, and how to improve it

Quad Cities Youth Conference

Staff served on the planning committee for the 2026 Quad Cities Youth Conference, providing learning opportunities for middle and high school students through various workshops, such as self-care, mental health, and finances as well as information tables. Multiple department programs had tables for the students to visit.

Black Expo and Resource Fair

Staff attended the Black Expo and Resource Fair hosted by the Lincoln Center. This event was held at Northpark Mall and included a host of business owners and entrepreneurs highlighting their business as well as community agencies and organizations sharing resources with the community. Department staff shared information on Hawki, Medicaid income guidelines, and sexual health with attendees.

Planning for Tobacco and Vaping Education at Youth Justice and Rehabilitation Center

Staff met with Youth Justice and Rehabilitation Center staff to discuss starting an evidence-based education curriculum on tobacco and vaping use. Programming will begin in March.

Breastfeeding Classes Offered

Staff facilitated a virtual breastfeeding class for three WIC participants and an in-person breastfeeding class for one participant from Pregnancy Resources. Staff members utilize the InJoy curriculum and cover the topics: How Breastfeeding Works, Latch & Positioning, When to Feed Baby, Getting Enough Milk, Breast Care, and Breastfeeding Lifestyle.

Education at Family Events

Staff attended a Kindergarten Round Up event at Madison Elementary School and shared information on Hawki and Medicaid income guidelines as well as I-Smile services. Staff also attended a Family Night for Friendly House families. Staff interacted with families about Hawki and the Healthy Pregnancy Program.

Strengthen, support, and mobilize communities, and partnerships to improve health

OD2A-S Team Connects on Strategies

The Scott County Overdose Data to Action in States (OD2A-S) Team met for a quarterly check-in on the progress of strategies under both the OD2A-S grant and the work being done by the opioid care coordinators in the county. The overdose prevention consultant continues to attempt new connections for the strategy of academic detailing by providing overview presentations at MercyOne Genesis, UnityPoint Health – Trinity, and Community Health Care, Inc. (CHC) locations. Both the overdose prevention consultant and peer recovery coach have built new relationships in the community to explore options for hosting outreach events, such as resource fairs, in Davenport and Eldridge. The opioid care coordinators have been providing presentations at Bettendorf, Davenport, and North Scott high schools in the health classes on opioids and overdose prevention.

PHAST Team Continues to Develop Infrastructure

The Scott County Public Health and Safety Team (PHAST) met to continue discussions on creating mission and vision statements. Following input from all members, both statements were finalized and approved by the team.

- Vision: “Scott County – a community free of overdose and problematic substance use.”
- Mission: “The Scott County Public Health and Safety Team (PHAST) collaborates and builds connections to promote stigma-free harm reduction in response to substance misuse through community engagement and compassionate support.”

The group also reviewed monthly statistics from the Overdose Detection Mapping Application Program (ODMAP), where the team can see real-time suspected overdose data entered by MEDIC EMS of Scott County. This information will be provided weekly to PHAST members. The topic of clusters of suspected overdoses was also brought up and team members agreed they would like to be notified as soon as possible if there are multiple incidents within 24-to-48-hours.

Food Rescue Partnership Hears Presentation on Davenport’s Fresh Initiative

Food Rescue Partnership members and department staff learned more about the City of Davenport’s FRESH Initiative from Bruce Berger, Director of Community & Economic Development. Mr. Berger explained that the project goal is to revitalize the Rockingham corridor and generate growth in the area to become a neighborhood of choice for businesses. The FRESH Initiative offers a grant of up to \$25,000 to support food-related ventures. Eligible businesses include, but are not limited to, restaurants, grocery stores, coffee shops, ice cream parlors, catering services, goods production, and drive-thru eateries.

Create, champion, and implement policies, plans, and laws that impact health

CHANGE Tool Assessments and Reassessments

Staff met with Brittany Wells, Visit Quad Cities, to provide an overview of the Community Transformation Program and workplace Community Health Assessment and Group Evaluation (CHANGE) Tool. Visit Quad Cities completed the evidence-based CHANGE Tool and staff will provide technical assistance to implement recommendations.

Staff met with McCarthy Bush Co. to complete the workplace CHANGE Tool reassessment. McCarthy-Bush Co. implemented many recommendations over the last year:

- Added Nahant Marsh volunteer opportunities to encourage physical activity
- Started implementing activity breaks for meetings that are longer than one hour
- Added a snack rack and drinks to the breakroom with healthy choices
- Strengthened the smokefree/tobacco-free policy to prohibit tobacco sales, promotions, and advertisements
- Promotes Quitline IA and Hawki materials
- Hosted a Hands-Only CPR & AED training
- Hosted a wellness fair that will become an annual event
- Conducted an employee wellness needs assessment

- Implemented mini surveys after events

Additionally, staff met with Eastern Iowa Community Colleges (EICC) to complete the workplace CHANGE Tool reassessment. Over the last year, EICC accomplished wellness questions in the employee survey, healthy vending options and marketing at the Clinton campus, Quitline Iowa materials, and the Chancellor joined the Quad City Health Initiative Board.

Consultation Provided to Child Care Providers

Staff visited a child care center with a Child Care Resource and Referral (CCR&R) consultant to assist the director in preparing for their annual licensing visit. During the visit, unsafe infant sleep was observed. Staff and the CCR&R consultant provided consultation on this topic and returned the following week to conduct a safe sleep checklist and reinforce safe sleep practices. Staff and the director expressed an understanding of safe sleep.

Staff conducted Health and Safety Checklist assessments at two child care centers. The checklist is a required component of Iowa’s quality rating improvement system, Iowa Quality for Kids (IQ4K), for providers applying for levels 3-5. The checklist process requires at least three onsite visits to assess, share findings, and support the development of a plan to meet best practices. Follow-up with both centers is ongoing.

Food Service Program Closure

A mobile unit from Nebraska called The Smoking Crab and Seafood Co. operated in Scott County for the first time. This business has multiple trailers (two licensed in Iowa) and travels around to different states. There were some questions regarding which units were operating in which locations. As a result, staff visited the mobile unit and upon arrival discovered that it was operating with no water, a requirement for hand and dish washing. In addition, there was no soap or paper towels and bags of shrimp were sitting out at room temperature. Staff prevented the unit from operating until the violations were corrected.

A follow-up visit conducted the next day, which the business knew would be occurring, found food preparation underway again with no water within the unit. As a result, the business was closed again until they could fill their water tank and bring the water up to appropriate

temperatures. The issues staff encountered were relayed to the Iowa Department of Inspections, Appeals, and Licensing (DIAL). The City of Davenport is also working with this business to get paperwork completed and the unit approved by the Davenport Fire Department.

Planning for Large Tattoo Events with DIAL

Staff had a virtual meeting with DIAL staff regarding two large tattoo events planned for this summer. One will be in Davenport in June and the other will be in Clinton in July. DIAL staff have experience with permits and inspections for similar events in Polk County and will continue to guide the department through the process.

Joint Inspection with Scott County Planning and Development

After a meeting including department staff, county attorneys, and the director of Planning and Development, staff accompanied the Planning and Development director on a tour of properties in unincorporated Scott County. These properties included several in western Scott County in the Blue Grass area and one in rural Bettendorf. It was determined that complaints about these properties are generally zoning violations rather than public health nuisance violations. The Planning and Development department will be the lead in addressing complaints regarding these properties.

2025-2026 Child Care Immunization Audits

Scott County’s child care immunization audit results were submitted and approved by HHS. A total of 4,921 immunization records were audited, and 4,898 children had valid immunization certificates (99.53%). There were 4,570 certificates of immunization (92.87%), 67 provisional (1.36%) certificates, two medical (0.04%) exemptions, 259 religious (5.26%) exemptions, and 23 non-acceptable certificates (0.47%).

The rate of religious exemptions increased to 5.26% in the 2025–2026 audit year, compared with 4.29% in the 2024–2025 audit year. The rate of non-acceptable certificates decreased from 0.61% last year to 0.47% this year. All other certificate categories remained relatively similar between the two audit years.

Assurance

Assure an effective system that enables access to the individual services and care needed to be healthy

Connections to Care within the Family Health Programs

I-Smile staff provided dental screenings, education, and fluoride treatment to children at six childcare centers, three elementary schools, and at WIC in Jackson County. For the first time, staff attended a Tot Time at the DeWitt Library to educate on oral care which included reading

a book, playing a game, and singing a song about brushing. Dental screenings with fluoride were offered and four children were seen for dental services.

Staff enrolled a 16-year-old into the Healthy Pregnancy Program and connected her to a doula. The client is in her first trimester. Staff met with a client within the Scott County Jail and at a prenatal appointment. The client was able to visit with her doula and talk about breathing techniques and a birth plan.

Health Screenings Underway at Non-Public Schools

Health screenings were conducted at two non-public schools during February. Twelve kindergarten students received dental screenings, and 18 students received vision screenings. One student was referred for a dental evaluation. The screenings will continue with the remaining non-public schools in March.

Community Screening and Education Provided

Staff delivered a presentation on safer sex and good dental hygiene to clients at REM. Approximately 20 individuals participated in the class. HIV testing and dental screenings were offered to all participants. Staff also conducted a presentation at CADS, followed by HIV/STI testing after the session. In addition, HIV/STI testing services were provided at SCJ.

Build and support a diverse and skilled public health workforce

Pre-Testing Messaging Webinar

Staff attended a webinar presented by Health Literacy Innovations about pre-testing consumer health materials. The practice of pre-testing helps to ensure the audience understands the intended message and prevents wasted resources. Pre-testing is a component of the Health Promotion Team's health promotion strategy process.

Mold Lunch and Learn

The Iowa Environmental Health Association and HHS hosted a "lunch and learn" about mold in homes which was attended by environmental staff. During the webinar, presenters discussed what mold is and how it forms, health effects, sources, remediation strategies and cleanup, proper personal protective equipment to wear, inspections, assessments, and ordinance review.

Community Support to Improve Health Outcomes

Staff attended the webinar, *February 2026 Panel Removing Barriers Collectively: Working Together to Improve Health Outcomes for Families*, hosted by the Michigan Breastfeeding Network. In this webinar panelists discussed how organizations and maternal health providers can work together with community organizations to improve health outcomes for families.

NEHA Hosts Bed Bug Webinar

Staff attended a bed bug webinar hosted by the National Environmental Health Association (NEHA). The following topics were covered: what bed bugs are, how they get there, real-world bed bug challenges, enforcement scenarios for bed bugs, research into new treatments for bed bugs as they have adapted and are resistant now to some treatments, and emerging issues.

Improve and innovate public health functions through ongoing evaluation, research, and continuous quality improvement

Review of DCO Process

Staff met with Scott County Emergency Management Agency (EMA) to review the county's procedure for dosimetry control officers (DCOs). DCOs are responsible for providing dosimetry equipment to emergency workers during a radiological incident/emergency. After the county dress rehearsal exercise in January with the nuclear power plant in Cordova, staff wanted to ensure that there were no changes needed before the graded exercise. The graded exercise was scheduled for the end of February but was postponed to May because FEMA evaluators were unable to travel.

Food Program Contract Review Materials Submitted to DIAL

The department received notice that DIAL would be conducting a contract review of the Food Program and that several items needed to be submitted to the state by the end of February for review. These reviews are done at least once during each contract period. Staff spent significant time reviewing and pulling together the required materials including training records, standing operating procedures, and staffing plans. The materials were submitted on time and as required. DIAL's results will be provided to the BOH once received.

Tobacco Program Visit with Iowa Primary Care Association

Several staff met with Jeremy Mask and other members of the Iowa Primary Care Association (PCA), along with members of Iowa HHS to discuss the Tobacco Grant and changes under the new behavioral health system. Staff shared the challenges and successes in FY26 so far, and discussed what improvements could be made to have better communication across the different agencies. Iowa PCA asked questions about what trainings and opportunities could better help the tobacco position and provided preliminary FY27 information.

Build and maintain a strong organizational infrastructure for public health

Family Health Program Updates Shared with Clinton and Jackson County Boards of Health

Staff attended the Clinton and Jackson County Boards of Health (BOH) meetings to provide program updates and service numbers for calendar year 2025. After hearing about lower numbers of participants with the Maternal Health program, the Jackson County BOH expressed experience using incentives to help increase interest in the program. Both boards expressed appreciation for the updates.

Department Infrastructure Teams

Health Equity Committee

The Health Equity Committee met with staff from the YWCA Empowerment Center in Davenport. The director of the Empowerment Center will be presenting during SCHED's March All Staff meeting to share the Center's unique philosophy regarding services and to provide an overview of how resources can be accessed. Staff will also be able to participate in a tour of the Center in April.

Health Promotion Team

The Health Promotion Team continues to work on two health promotion strategies. OnMedia has developed a 30 second and a 15 second ad each for kids and adults as part of the oral health promotion strategy. This will run from April to June. The preparedness health promotion strategy will focus on reunification and education for youth and their families.

The team reviewed the content developed for display in the clinic waiting room this spring. The adult focused messages relate to STI clinic, severe weather, and support for quitting smoking/vaping. The children/family content features information on severe weather, handwashing, oral health, and family emergency planning. It will also include a two-minute video on breast and cervical cancer screening through the Care For Yourself program.

Public Health Policy Committee

Members of the Public Health Policy Committee have been actively monitoring legislation introduced, attending subcommittee/committee meetings, and engaging with elected officials. In one instance this month, one of Scott County's Senators proactively requested information regarding the potential impact of a piece of legislation.

Two members of the committee represented SCHD at the Iowa Public Health Association's Day on the Hill in Des Moines. This event provided public health professionals with the opportunity to collectively gather and engage elected officials regarding bills under consideration. Staff were able to engage with Senator Mike Zimmer and Representatives Ken Croken and Monica Kurth while at the Capitol. Senator Winckler visited IPHA's table while staff were attending a meeting. Representative Mohr also advised that he would not be at the Capitol due to a family death. Additionally, they were able to attend two public health related subcommittee meetings and provide feedback on SSB3135 (*renumbered SF2432) regarding powers and duties of local/city, county, and district boards of health.

Quality Improvement Council

The Quality Improvement (QI) Council met and reviewed the progress on the two existing QI Projects: Events and Interns. The QI Council also discussed a half-day training option that can be delivered by performance improvement consultants with HHS.

Workplace Culture Committee

The Workplace Culture Committee hosted the *Be Your Best Self at Work* half-day training in early February. Following the training, committee members discussed the training, ways to keep the training topics within the daily work of the department and developed a follow-up survey for staff. In addition, the deBeaumont Foundation, the organization that facilitates the Public Health Workforce Interests and Needs Survey (PH WINS), will complete a PH WINS Pulse check that includes a small subset of core questions from PH WINS 2024 related to well-being, job satisfaction, and intent to leave. While the department will not receive any data from this report, committee members shared information with staff to be prepared should they be selected randomly to participate.

Workforce Development Committee

The Workforce Development Committee hosted two Microsoft Excel workshops for staff. These workshops provided in-depth tutorials for using the software and provided examples of ways to make work more efficient. Software training was one of the areas identified in the staff survey regarding areas of growth requested. Additional workshops on presentation/graphic software will be hosted in May. Department staff are the facilitators for these sessions.
