Assessment

Assess and monitor population health status, factors that influence health, and community needs and assets

Investigate, diagnose, and address health problems and hazards affecting the population

Communicable Disease Program

Four confirmed communicable diseases were reported during April. They included one case each of campylobacteriosis, legionellosis, salmonellosis, and Alpha-Gal Syndrome. One hepatitis A case was also reported and investigated, but this was determined not to be a case by the healthcare provider.

Animal Bite Program

In April, 16 individuals required rabies risk assessments after exposure to nine dogs, one cat, two bats, and two raccoons. Three individuals were exposed after caring for a baby raccoon that had fallen from the attic into the wall cavity of a home. The raccoon was later turned over to the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. Thirteen victims were recommended for rabies prevention treatment for a high-risk exposure or bite above the shoulders, and four victims started treatment.

Sexually Transmitted Disease Program

Forty-six individuals received sexual health services at the department during April. Two clients tested positive for chlamydia, three clients tested positive for gonorrhea, and one client tested positive for syphilis at the department's sexual health clinic. An additional five clients tested positive for chlamydia, one client tested positive for gonorrhea, and one client tested positive for syphilis in the department's express clinic. In total, 84 cases of chlamydia, 28 cases of gonorrhea, and six cases of syphilis were reported in Scott County during the month. There were 24 additional syphilis cases investigated and determined to be out of jurisdiction, not identified as a case, or had a pending result. These cases were closed, referred, or remained open pending additional results.

Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program

In April, there were 12 lead poisoned children on the department's caseload. The children receive public health nursing case management services until three blood lead levels equal to or below 15 ug/dL or two consecutive blood lead levels equal to or below 10 ug/dL are obtained. Of these 12 children, three had a blood lead level greater than 20 ug/dL, one had a blood lead level between 15-19 ug/dL, seven had blood lead levels between 10-14 ug/dL, and one child had a blood lead level less than 10 ug/dL.

One child with a blood lead level over >20 ug/dL met the criteria for chelation. The child was hospitalized and treated with Succimer, an oral chelating agent that binds to lead in the blood and is excreted by the kidneys. The child will receive 19 days of treatment. Department staff collaborated with Scott County Community Services to provide a short-term housing option which allowed the child to be discharged from the hospital to a lead-free location while plans for temporary housing until the residence is remediated could be developed by the family.

Two children utilizing the department's immunization clinic accepted lead testing services at their April appointment; testing did not result in identification of lead poisoning.

Staff completed two initial lead inspections of Davenport properties where children with elevated blood lead level reside. Interior and exterior lead hazards were identified at each of the properties.

Staff completed a visual lead clearance inspection at a Davenport property following the completion of lead hazard remediation work performed at the property. The lead remediation work was insufficient, so further dust wipe testing was not performed. The lead safe renovator was educated on additional steps that needed to be taken prior to dust wipe sampling being performed.

Staff continue to provide lead dust wipe clearance testing for properties associated with elevated blood level children. Properties remain on the department's caseload until they pass the clearance test. Unfortunately, most properties do not achieve clearance after the first testing. This month staff completed initial testing, second testing, and third testing at three different properties. Multiple samples are taken at each property; fortunately, only those specific locations (i.e. floor, window trough) that do not pass must be retested after additional cleaning or remediation work is done.

Policy Development

Communicate effectively to inform and educate people about health factors that influence it, and how to improve it

Web Content Accessibility Standards Compliance Delayed

The U.S. Department of Justice announced a formal extension of the compliance dates for web content and mobile application accessibility that was to be implemented on April 24, 2026. The rule requires that local government web content and mobile applications meet technical standards to address accessibility. The department will continue to support the Scott County Information Technology Department as plans to meet the technical standards are implemented and to identify training on all technical requirements to ensure content the department creates and puts on the website meets the requirements and is accessible to all members of the public.

Presentations to Augustana Classes

Staff presented to students in the Introduction to Public Health classes at Augustana College about the opioid epidemic, the opioid settlement funds, and how Scott County has prioritized strategies for the initial use of funds. One of the opioid care coordinators from Scott County Community Services assisted with the presentations to share information about their role and success stories of individuals who have received care coordination.

I was able to provide a presentation for Augustana College's Epidemiology class about the Scott County Health Department, the department's structure and programs, and ways that the department collaborates in the community. All students were pursuing either a public health major or minor; they were engaged and asked thoughtful questions.

ISTEP Activities at Davenport Central Health School

Staff helped to facilitate an Iowa Students for Tobacco Education and Prevention (ISTEP) activity at Davenport Central High School. Three students from the ISTEP chapter hosted a table during their lunch period to provide fellow students with education on vaping and the dangers of using these products.

Education at Friendly House's 130th Anniversary Event

Staff attended the Friendly House's 130th Anniversary Celebration. Friendly House has been a cornerstone in the community providing vital resources, support, and meaningful program opportunities for children, families and seniors. Staff hosted a table to share information on I-Smile and I-Smile Silver, Medicaid/Hawki Insurance benefits, clinical services, as well as tobacco/vaping services. Attendees had an opportunity to engage with staff and learn about the services provided at Scott County Health Department.

Community Baby Shower Provides Opportunities to Educate and Engage

Staff attended a baby shower hosted by the Vince Jetter Community Center at Journey Church in Clinton, Iowa. Several community organizations were in attendance providing attendees with information and items to support their pregnancy, infant care, and addressing health/social needs of the entire family. Staff provided information on the Healthy Pregnancy Program, I-Smile, Hawki/Medicaid insurance, and car seat tags.

The car seat tags include contact info that could be used to support family reunification after emergencies. This year's focus for public health preparedness in the region is on youth. Participants were asked for feedback about the tags and the information that went with them. Their responses were recorded and brought back to the department to better guide development of the materials to be given with the car seat tags as part of a health promotion strategy.

National Infant Immunization Week

National Infant Immunization Week took place during the last week of April. Social media posts and posters were created to encourage parents to vaccinate their newborns and to ask their healthcare provider about any questions.

Family Engagement Night at Madison Elementary School

Staff participated in a Family Engagement Night through United Way at Madison Elementary School to promote Medicaid/Hawki insurance benefits and I-Smile, including care coordination as needed.

Strengthen, support, and mobilize communities, and partnerships to improve health

Food Rescue Partnership Food Rescue Results Presented

One of the department's interns presented an overview of the food rescue survey results to Food Rescue Partnership (FRP) stakeholders. Approximately 25 percent of the responding food establishments indicated they are currently donating food and reported that transportation and a database to track food donations would simplify the process. Of those not donating food, food establishments indicated they do not have food waste, they are unsure of how to donate

food, and/or have liability concerns. Overall, 43 percent of respondents want to learn more about the FRP. The intern is finalizing the survey responses and report to conclude her internship. FRP will utilize the results to plan its 2026 Food Rescue Workshop.

PHAST Continues Discussion on Data and Trends

The Scott County Public Health and Safety Team (PHAST) held its monthly meeting to discuss current trends, barriers, and efforts to address overdoses in the community. One discussion topic included the rise in stimulant-involved overdose deaths at the state level in Iowa according to 2024 data. Team members agreed stimulant use is prevalent in Scott County as well and requested county-level data for the same year to compare trends. Another topic of discussion was the lack of a centralized system for tracking individuals as they are navigating services from multiple agencies. Sometimes, individuals have multiple appointments for the same service between different agencies or within the same agency. This can make it difficult to avoid duplication of services for some individuals. The group reviewed data from the Overdose Detection Mapping Application Program (ODMAP) and discussed other types of local data to collect and analyze. All partners agreed to explore what types of data their agency can share with the PHAST team to inform efforts moving forward.

Tobacco Free Quad Cities Planning for Partners and Events

Staff facilitated the Tobacco Free Quad Cities Coalition meeting. Members discussed the Partnership Assessment Tool that is done annually to review partners at the table, levels of capacity, and what sectors need representation. The group also discussed upcoming community events and planning for summer outreach.

MOMSS Meeting in Clinton County

Staff attended the Mood, Mental Health, Substance Use, and Social Support (MOMSS) initiative community meeting in Clinton hosted by the Iowa HHS Perinatal Quality Care Collaborative (IPQCC). HHS shared that mental health-related conditions are reported to be the leading cause of maternal mortality in the U.S. and Iowa data supports that as well. The MOMSS initiative is designed to facilitate collaboration between perinatal providers (hospitals and clinics) and community resource providers like public health and social service organizations to support hand offs and improve service navigation for mutual patients. The conversations among organizations were very helpful as several clinics and hospitals in the service area were present. Attendees will be invited to join the Healthy Pregnancy Coalition.

Scott County Oral Health Network

Staff hosted the Scott County Oral Health Network meeting to share program updates and learn about special health care needs among children in the community. The guest speaker was from Child Health Specialty Clinics (CHSC) at the Bettendorf satellite of the University of Iowa HealthCare Stead Family Pediatrics Specialty Clinics. Attendees left with a better understanding of how they can provide assessments/family navigation services for children with special health care needs and assist with referrals for behavioral health programs.

Create, champion, and implement policies, plans, and laws that impact health

Nuisance Ordinance Update

An internal team is continuing to draft an update to the Scott County Nuisance Ordinance. The next steps in the process will be to engage stakeholders for input on the draft ordinance. This will include Scott County Administration, Planning and Development, and Attorney’s Office. The goal is to bring the revised ordinance to the Board of Health and Board of Supervisors later this year for consideration.

CHANGE Tool Recommendations Presented to Visit Quad Cities

Staff presented an overview of the Community Transformation Program and workplace Community Health Assessment and Group Evaluation (CHANGE) Tool recommendations at a Visit Quad Cities all staff meeting. Staff provided Visit Quad Cities staff with walking maps and employee wellness surveys to be completed and will summarize the employee wellness survey results for the Visit Quad Cities wellness committee to determine next steps.

Preparedness Plan Work Session

Staff, along with other members of Public Health Preparedness Region 5, participated in a public health work session focused on updating regional and departmental preparedness plans. In addition, Penny Vacek, staff for U.S. Senator Charles Grassley, talked with attendees about public health related programming questions and concerns.

Consultations for Child Care Centers

Staff conducted a Health and Safety Checklist assessment at a child care center. Additional follow-up with this center is scheduled in May. The checklist is a required component of Iowa’s quality rating improvement system, Iowa Quality for Kids (IQ4K), for programs applying for levels three to five. The checklist process requires at least three onsite visits to assess, share findings, and support the development of a plan to meet best practices. In addition, one center that was assessed in March finished the checklist process this month.

Staff also met with a child care center director and board member to discuss plans to update the center’s outdoor playground. They reviewed best practice resources for designing outdoor play spaces, including safe surfacing and climbing equipment recommendations.

Utilize legal and regulatory actions designed to improve and protect the public’s health

Food Service Program

Staff taught a 15-hour ServSafe course in April. Of the 20 individuals who took the exam, 16 students passed and earned their Certified Food Protection Manager certification. The average passing score was 81.07 percent.

Swimming Pool Program

Staff met Alison Young, the state’s pool engineer, for the pre-opening inspection of the Mississippi Mist interactive fountain in Muscatine. This facility had been closed since 2023 after an incident occurred there. The fountain has been reconstructed to comply with the Iowa Swimming Pool Rules. It was approved for re-opening after a satisfactory report from the state engineer. Department staff will conduct a routine inspection this summer after the facility is in operation.

Staff also accompanied Alison Young on a post construction inspection of a new outdoor pool facility at Birchwood Grove, a new apartment complex in Davenport. There were a few violations noted that will be simple to correct. Department staff will reinspect to verify the corrections.

Finally, staff joined Alison Young on a visit to Riverview Lodge in LeClaire. The department had closed the pool when staff became aware that the facility had been operating without state registration. Staff advised the owner of the requirements to comply with the Iowa Swimming Pool Rules. Ms. Young has also been in contact with the owner of the facility and took the opportunity to visit the facility in person while she was in Scott County. After assessment of the pool, a few issues will need to be resolved including a variance request for the non-compliant color of the pool bottom and new overhead lighting.

Staff sent an electronic message to all the outdoor pool facilities in the four counties the department is contracted to inspect: Clinton, Jackson, Muscatine and Scott. The message reminded pool owners and operators to contact the department to schedule their pre-opening inspections. Included in the information was a link for operators to find contact information for the inspector assigned to their facility and resources to assist them in preparing their facilities for the compliance inspection.

Assurance

Assure an effective system that enables access to the individual services and care needed to be healthy

Stop the Bleed Kit Distribution

The Region 5 Public Health Preparedness Coalition provided an opportunity for local public and non-public schools to request Stop the Bleed Kits, if someone on staff had been trained regarding their use. Department staff completed the distribution of over 350 Stop the Bleed kits

to non-public schools and public schools in Scott County. An additional opportunity to order kits is underway with distribution to occur this summer.

Presumptive Eligibility Application

Staff assisted with a Medicaid presumptive eligibility application for a pregnant client in her first trimester with high risk factors, as well as her two children who needed dental care. The family can now access ambulatory medical and dental care, including early prenatal care.

Oral Health Supplies Provided

Staff supplied oral health and tooth brushing program information for implementation into Head Start. Staff also supplied oral care information to be used in packets for maternal health clients.

Veteran Support Provided through Iowa Veterans Trust Fund

Staff assisted a Veteran who needs dentures and is eligible for the Iowa Veterans Trust Fund. During a dental exam, a local dentist identified a lesion in the maxilla and referred the Veteran to an oral surgeon for diagnosis. The Veteran receives medical care through the Veterans Administration (VA) but does not qualify for dental services. He initially asked his VA primary care provider for a referral to the VA dental clinic in Iowa City, but was referred to an ear, nose, and throat doctor (ENT) instead. The ENT advised that he needed to see an oral surgeon, which the Veteran cannot afford. Staff contacted a VA social worker, who successfully arranged a referral to the VA dental clinic in Iowa City. The goal is for the VA to diagnose and treat the lesion, after which the Veteran can obtain dentures through the Iowa Veterans Trust Fund.

Staff Receive CPR Recertification through MEDIC EMS of Scott County

In April, department staff completed their CPR recertification through MEDIC EMS of Scott County (MEDIC). Since joining the County, MEDIC has provided CPR training for employees, streamlining efforts and eliminating duplication of services previously provided by the Employee Health Program. MEDIC offers classroom space, certified instructors, and all necessary equipment at their facility. CPR certification is renewed every two years.

STI, HIV, and Hepatitis C (HCV) Outreach Testing

During the month of April, staff conducted testing at the Scott County Jail on two occasions, The Center - Love in Action, and Humility of Homes. Staff also delivered an STI/HIV/HCV educational presentation at CADS and offered testing to participants following the class. In total, 72 individuals received STI/HIV/HCV testing and education during the month. Any individuals who tested positive were either treated in-house or referred to appropriate follow-up care and treatment.

Build and support a diverse and skilled public health workforce

Quad Cities Regional Disaster Conference

Several staff attended the 2026 Quad Cities Regional Disaster Conference. Sessions included Legionnaire's Disease Investigation; Young Lives, Big Plans; Integrating Pediatrics into Disaster Drills; Active Shooter Response; Cybersecurity: Cyber Incidents, Threats, and Prevention; and Finding Hope in the Worst Night Ever.

Healthiest State Workplace Conference

Staff attended the 2026 Healthiest State Workplace Conference. The conference sessions were: Movement-at-Work as Performance Infrastructure; If You Think This is a Gen Z Problem, It's Probably You; Cancer in Iowa: Community and Workplace Strategies; Make It OK; Reflective Supervision as a Wellness Strategy: Supporting the Humans Behind the Work; and Everyone's Doomscrolling: Thriving in a Digitally Distracted Workplace.

Public Health Conference of Iowa

Staff attended the Public Health Conference of Iowa, listening to sessions on a variety of topics, including servant leadership, water quality, values-based communication, railroad preparedness, high impact internships, use of artificial intelligence in public health, RAGBRAI preparedness planning, quality improvement tools, data visualization tools, and tabletop exercise planning.

Brooke Barnes participated in a speaker panel during a pre-conference session titled *Up Your Policy Game by Building Trust*, representing the policy work of the department. The session promoted relationship-building as a public health skill, shared peer perspectives, and guided participants through the steps of starting a conversation with decision-makers. Ms. Barnes shared the department's public health policy journey, Public Health Policy Plan, and annual workplan as resources to help participants begin the work.

Iowa Governor's Conference on Behavioral Health

Staff attended the Iowa Governor's Conference on Behavioral Health. This two-day virtual conference feature sessions on a wide range of topics including Navigating the New Behavioral Health System, Current State Trends in Substance Use and Overdose, Utilizing Peers in Diverse Settings, and sessions on specific substances.

Retail Program Standards Symposium

Staff attended two days of the virtual 2026 Retail Program Standards Symposium. The Symposium brought together retail food safety jurisdictions at the state, local, tribal, and territorial levels to support and strengthen their work with the Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) Voluntary National Retail Food Regulatory Program Standards. Presentations discussed uniform inspection programs, industry relations, training and retention strategies, and foodborne illness response.

Basic Public Information Officer Course

Brooke Barnes participated as a guest speaker for a Basic Public Information Officer course hosted at Scott County Emergency Management Agency. This course was identified as a need by the Scott County Public Information Officers Committee, a group that has been reengaged to support the communication needs and collaboration between the governmental partners in Scott County. The three-day course was a good step to increasing knowledge of the role of communications staff during various emergencies. The committee continues to meet every other month to establish training needs, identify opportunities for exercising skills, and further relationship building.

Iowa Preventive and Community Dentistry Annual Continuing Education Day

Staff attended the University of Iowa Preventive and Community Dentistry Annual Continuing Education Day with presentations on various topics including advocacy for insurance, nutrition effects on oral health, working with dementia patients, and dental hospitality.

Improve and innovate public health functions through ongoing evaluation, research, and continuous quality improvement

Community-Based Screening Services Quality Report

The department received the First Quarter 2026 Community-Based Screening Services (CBSS) Quality Report. There was a 6.8 percent increase in testing by CBSS providers. There were 8,076 tests processed among the CBSS test sites in the first quarter of 2026, compared to 7,560 tests in the first quarter of 2025. The positivity rate for chlamydia increased to 6.8 percent in the first quarter of 2026, compared to 6.3 percent in the first quarter of 2025. The positivity rate for gonorrhea decreased from 2.4 percent in the first quarter of 2025 to 2.1 percent in the first quarter of 2026.

Retail Food Program Standard 4 Met

The Food Team has spent considerable time over the last year focusing on implementing the requirements of the FDA's Retail Food Program Standard 4, Uniform Inspection Program. Work to meet this standard involves engaging in assurance activities to verify uniform interpretation by each inspector of regulatory requirements and program procedures. Staff conducted a self-assessment of their work towards meeting the standard. The self-assessment document and supporting documentation was submitted to the Iowa Department of Inspections, Appeals, and Licensing (DIAL). DIAL verified the results of the department's self-assessment, and the department now meets Standard 4, which is required by the department's contract with DIAL. Further work continues to address each of the 9 standards.

Build and maintain a strong organizational infrastructure for public health

Risk Manager Interviews

The department had the opportunity to participate in interviews for the Scott County Risk Manager position. The department utilizes the risk manager to guide its response to various open records requests, to review related internal procedures, to establish requirements of the Employee Health Program, and to support Correctional Health in a variety of manners. The risk manager position will be moving back to the Human Resources Department. The current risk manager will be retiring this summer.

Department Infrastructure Teams

Health Equity Committee

No new updates to share.

Health Promotion Team

The Health Promotion Team continues to work on the oral health promotion strategy. The media campaign will wrap up soon and data will be collected from OnMedia. The preparedness

and youth health promotion strategy is underway. The team developed educational messaging and tested it with families at the Community Baby Shower in Clinton. The plan is to distribute educational materials and car seat identification tags at various events this summer. The team discussed a need identified from a quality improvement project for a group to manage the department's event requests and determined feasibility for the Health Promotion Team to serve in that role.

Public Health Policy Committee

The Public Health Policy Committee continued to monitor the Iowa Legislature's actions as it moved towards the end of the session. The Committee also discussed its workplan and identified areas still underway, such as utilizing the Policy Review Tool during the Nuisance Ordinance Update Process.

Quality Improvement Council

The QI Council continues to work on the internship and event planning QI projects. The Family Health team completed the customer satisfaction survey of the Maternal Health Program, and the Community Health team is currently collecting data for a Tobacco Program customer satisfaction survey. The annual NACCHO Roadmap Survey will be completed in May to help guide the next workplan.

Workplace Culture Committee

The Workplace Culture Committee facilitated a feedback session at the April All Staff meeting regarding staff's use of Cloverleaf, an online platform designed to improve team and individual performance. The Committee also sought feedback on the department's Value Statement including whether the statements still reflect the values of the department and if the actions called out remain realistic expectations of the team.

Workforce Development Committee

The Workforce Development Committee reviewed the third quarter performance measure regarding the percent a staff completing the required 12 hours of education annually. As of March 31, 82 percent of staff have met the measure. Overall, 1,287.58 hours of education have been tracked. Using an average loaded salary rate of \$54.36 per hour, the department has invested \$69,992.85 worth of staff time in professional development/training. The committee also reviewed the feedback received following the Excel Workforce Workshop and finalized plans for the Canva/PowerPoint Workshop that will be held in May.
