Lead Poisoning Prevention

Lead poisoning continues to be a serious concern in Iowa's children. A blood lead level of greater than 5mcg/dl (micrograms per deciliter) is considered elevated and interventions should be taken to prevent the risk of health and developmental concerns from lead poisoning.

Lead poisoning has harmful effects on nearly all organ systems in the body. It is especially harmful to the developing brain and nervous system of children un-

der the age of 6 years. Lead poisoning in childhood can result in long term health effects.

Recently in Iowa, 2 toddlers that had routine blood lead level testing were found to have very high lead levels (47-65 mcg/dl) requiring hospitalization for one of the toddlers.

Children at high risk and between one year and 4 years of age should have a blood lead level tested at least every year. Children at

high risk are those who live or spend time in housing built before 1978, or have other exposure to lead. A child's risk can increase when they become more mobile and can access areas where lead based paint may be present, such as porches, windows, and outdoor areas near the foundation of houses.

Child Abuse Awareness Month

April is Child Abuse Awareness Month. Research has identified 5 protective factors that reduce the risk of child abuse:

Nurturing and Attachment

Developing a close bond with a child helps parents and caregivers relate, respond and communicate with the child.

Knowledge of Parenting and Child Development

Understanding child development can be calming for parents and caregivers, responding appropriately to a child's behavior.

Parental and Caregiver Resilience

Recognizing the signs of stress and enhancing problem-

solving skills can improve the ability to cope.

Social Connections

Identifying a network of family, friends, and neighbors provides support in times of need.

Concrete Support

Access to financial, housing, medical, and other resources and services help meet basic needs.

A= Age Appropriate Design

F= Fall Surfacing

E= Equipment Maintenance
