With the shared goal of connecting children to local food, Farm to ECE is an extension of the Farm to School movement, which focuses on birth through preschool age. Partners from around the state who represent various sectors of education, along with the local food systems, serve on the lowa Farm to School and Early Care Coalition. The Coalition facilitates the work to create a cohesive message for all ages of Iowa's children. The three main elements of Farm to ECE and Farm to School are installing site gardens for experiential learning, sourcing locally grown food for lunch and snacks, and educating children about food and where it comes from.

Childcare providers who follow Farm to ECE practices and policies, support a healthier generation of children while enriching their own communities and creating a market for local farmers. Activities can and should be adapted to the
