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Back to School To Do's: Immunizations, Lead Tests & Dental Screenings

Health plays a large role in helping your child succeed in school. As you prepare your child for the school year, don't forget to add immunizations, blood lead testing, and dental screening to your "Back to School To Do" list along with the pencils, backpack, and notebooks.


☑ Immunizations


Immunizations are an important step in protecting your child, your family, and your community against serious and sometimes deadly diseases. Some immunizations are required for school attendance and some are recommended for your child.


You may already know that immunizations are important, but do you know how they work? Here is how:

When germs such as bacteria or viruses invade the body, the body's immune system has to fight the infection. Once it fights off the infection, the body is left with a supply of cells that helps recognize and fight that disease in the future.

Immunizations help develop immunity by pretending to be an infection, but this pretend infection does not cause illness. Instead, it causes the immune system to develop the same response as it does to a real infection so the body







and fight the vaccine preventable disease in the future. This illustration explains how an immunization works.

☑ Blood Lead Test

Lead is a metal that was used for many years in products in and around our homes and is dangerous to the human body. More than 60% of lowa's housing was built before 1960 and may have lead-based paint in it. Young children are most at risk to the dangerous effects of lead, including learning problems, damage to the brain, kidneys and nervous system, and even death. Unfortunately, 1 in 14 lowa children is lead-poisoned, a number that is four times higher than the national average.

The best way to protect your child is by having your child's blood tested for

lead. Children should have their blood tested at least once a year until they are 6 years old to continue to make sure they do not come into contact with lead as they become more active.

All lowa children must have proof of a blood lead test before starting kindergarten. Talk with your child's doctor or the Scott County Health Department about scheduling a blood lead test before your child begins kindergarten.

☑ Dental Screening

How do you know kids are ready for school? Check their smiles! Healthy teeth means healthy kids! Kindergarten and ninth grade students must bring a certificate of dental screening to school. It's required. Call the I-Smile™ coordinator if you need help with dental care.
