Protect Baby with Vaccines

National Infant Immunization Week: April 22-29, 2017

Children need to be fully immunized to stay healthy. Vaccines have helped to improve the health of children in the United States (US). They help the body fight germs that would otherwise make infants and young children very sick or even die. Most parents today have never seen the terrible effects of these sicknesses on a family or the community. Vaccine-preventable illness is still found around the world, and outbreaks happen. We must protect our children by giving vaccines on time!

Vaccinating babies on time protects them from 14 serious illnesses like measles and whooping cough before age two. The vaccine plan is designed to protect children early in life, when they are most vulnerable, and before they are exposed to life-threatening illness. Are the babies in your life protected?
