Primal PPE

The pandemic has put Personal Protective Equipment at center stage, and perhaps no form of PPE has a longer or more storied history than the humble condom. Humans have developed and used devices like condoms since prehistoric times, using such materials as animal skin and organs, plant-based fabrics, silk, and somewhat questionable choices like horns and tortoise shell. Charles Goodyear's discovery of rubber vulcanization in 1839 and the invention of latex in the 1920's greatly improved upon the original concept, delivering the first modern lubricated condoms in 1957—still one of our most effective methods to prevent unintentional pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections. February is observed as national condom month by the American Sexual Health Association, meant to highlight this low-cost, highly effective method of family planning and protecting sexual health.

The Spice of Life

Variety, of course! We have progressed from clumsy, marginally effective materials to safer, more comfortable latex and latex-free alternatives, and condoms are now available in sizes, styles, colors, textures, and flavors to make protecting sexual health just as pleasurable as it is responsible. Health Risk

Radon gas is a tasteless and odorless gas that is excreted by the decomposition of naturally occurring radioactive elements in soils and rocks. As these elements break down, they produce radon gas. Radon gas harms the lung tissue by damaging DNA. Radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer in the world, behind smoking. Radon is responsible for around 21,000 lung cancer deaths in the nation each year. The risk is even higher for smokers. The link above will guide you to a chart displaying the general risk of radon compared to other causes of death.

The Solution

The first step to avoiding the damaging effects of radon is to get your house tested. Radon tests can typically be found at your local hardware stores or even online. The tests are generally just a packet of activated charcoal that will uptake the gas. Once they have completed their cycle, they are sent to the lab listed on the test. The action level for radon gas is 4pCi/l. There are professional companies that can help you mitigate your exposure.



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
