November's meeting will be held in St. Mary's Church, the fourth oldest Catholic Church in Davenport. This church has the distinction of being situated in Davenport's oldest Catholic cemetery. The cornerstone was laid in 1867; construction on the church proper was completed in 1869. Over the years, additional features have been added, including a spire and bell in 1880, and an organ in 1883. There originally were plans to add a clock to the tower in 1880, but for reasons unknown, this installation never occurred.

The organ in St. Mary's was built

by the local Moline Pipe Organ Company. At the time of its installation, it was ranked as the second best in Iowa. Standing 26 feet high at the center and utilizing 994 pipes in all, the organ was originally hand pumped. This

organ is to be the focus of our meeting; Mr. Rodney Levsen, of the Levsen Organ Company, will be elaborating on the organ's features and history, and our own SCHPS member Roberta Shadensack will be playing upon it for us.

This prompted the purchase of the 4 plex (called Miss Ella's), its renovation and rental so that Bill and Mary had control of their next door neighbors. During the restoration period, Bill discovered that problem water in the cottage's basement was coming from one of the many springs in the area. A pump was installed, the water pumped to a holding tank for watering plants in the nursery in back of the cottage and two problems were solved at once!! Bill and Mary have many personal ties to this area and Bill's plane will be touching down here in the future. So hopefully we'll be able to stay in touch.
