Meet the Smiley's and Tour Their Historic Home—*The Severin Miller House!*

The Severin Miller house dates back to the 1860's to the early days of Davenport settlement when the city was a small river settlement surrounded by farms. Miller was an immigrant from Prussia and was a prominent metal worker. The house used local materials, a simple utilitarian form and is in the Greek Revival style.

The Smileys have done an outstanding job of preservation and restoration. Barry has done much work since we last visited and is anxious to show us what he's done and to show us the new antiques they have acquired. Refreshments will be served after the meeting. The house is located at 2200 Telegraph Road in West Davenport. There is parking near the house, we'll see you at 7pm!



An antique cars exhibit was held across from SCHPS member Steve Andrews' home. Concrete footings have been laid for a combination traffic barrier and railing and arch near the Western Avenue steps.

Near Steve's home was a sign reading "Architectural Reuse Warehouse." Gold Coast restorers can now use the Christian Jipp grocery store at 730 Warren as an exchange center. The building dates back to the 1860's and has a wonderful Mississippi River view. This landmark has been vacant for many years and was threatened with demolition.
