





"Halloween Traveling Dinner House Tour" October 8, 2009, at 6 P. M.—Paid Members Only (Parking on Kuehl St. at west end of Mound & 13th St. RR Bridge)

No tricks—just all treats here! SCHPS October 8th Halloween Traveling Dinner Tour will begin at the 1857 Charles Stein House (1917 E. 13th Street), which was once one of the SCARRIEST haunts in all the Village of East Davenport. So scary that the City turned down repeated offers from Gordon and Mary Ellen Jensen to buy it. Small wonder, after City inspectors walked through the garbage filled backyard, where a runaway commercial dump truck had once overturned...climbed over a cat filled sofa on

the back porch to peer at the trashed interior, through broken windows...stood in the middle of the basement and looked three stories straight up at daylight streaming through the holes in the roof---then, promptly declared the house beyond anyone's ability to save. Thanks to the Jensen's dogged perseverance, the house was eventually saved from the wrecking ball—"and the rest is history." In 1996, the Jensens moved and the Stein House's remarkable renovation moved forward under the able stewardship and hard labors of Tim Huey (Head of Scott County Planning & Zoning) and wife Sandy Doran (Landscape Architect), with the help of their ever faithful family friend, contractor Bob Buck. The stunning transformation of this hulk of a condemned house into a magazine worthy centerfold spread is a textbook example of what happens when the sound economics of historic preservation



plus a love of history, combines to create one-of-a-kind housing opportunities in the middle of what once was considered a "throw away" central city neighborhood. And, who better to teach that preservation lesson than Tim Huey, the County official whose vision will lead Scott County Planning and Zoning on into the future.

Tim and Sandy have graciously invited SCHPS members in to view their latest round of major rehab projects, which include the renovation of the teetering exposed native fieldstone walls which line their finished walk-out basement rooms. (The walk-out basement office, exercise and hobby rooms lead out onto a patio overlooking their hillside stair-stepped backyard gardens, with two fountains.) The full length balcony porch offers inviting views out across the distant river valley. The adjacent kitchen features a vaulted ceiling and a central exposed brick chimney. Great care was taken to preserve and repaint the 152 year old pine plank floor boards throughout the house. The creative use of salvaged historic interior doors to create library cabinets and hidden wall computer centers is a "must see" for old house owners who are always looking for more storage space.

Although, it is an out of print book, it can still be purchased "new" on line for as little as \$20.00. It is a beautifully illustrated book, filled with antique paintings and color lithographs of Mississippi River towns, from New Orleans to St. Paul. It includes 11 historic images of early Davenport, paired with histories of the frontier artists who created them and firsthand descriptions of the river towns by the early writers of the day.
