# Guided walking tour hosted by professional preservation planner, Rebecca McCarley



Our meeting on Thursday October 14 will start at 6:30 p.m. with a walking tour of the picturesque Oak Lane Historic District. The 25 houses along the two-block length of Oak Lane represent housing developments around the turn of the  $20^{th}$  century in Davenport. At this time, Locust was a major street car line, and Oak Lane extended into the rural area north of Locust providing housing with easy access to the line. Amos Cutter, Real estate developer, platted the south 12 lots of the first addition in the 1890s, following by the north 16 lots of the second addition at the end of the 1890s. The original farmhouse, a frame Italianate house, was retained within the development. Construction of the other houses spanned the next decade. By 1910, all 25 houses were constructed, including styles

such as Queen Anne, Shingle, Georgian Revival, and Colonial Revival. While the largest homes built were by wealthy families in the first addition, the houses within the second addition built for middle class families are also substantial in size.

As our light disappears, we will continue our meeting with a tour of the Horace G. and Dorothy L. Roberts House at 17 Oak Lane. The two-story Georgian Revival was built in 1903 for the Roberts family, who previously lived nearby. Horace Gordon Roberts, at age 28, was vice president and treasurer of the U.N. Roberts Company, a lumber and sash

business started by his father in East Davenport in 1866. Along with his brother Edward C. Roberts and partner Harry Van Tine Scott, Horace founded the mail-order Gordon-Van Tine Company in 1907. The company initially supplied Sears with building materials, then launched their own mail order house and materials line in 1912. Horace served as general manager of the Gordon-Van Tine Company and of the U.N. Roberts Company. By 1926, he was president of both companies, as well as the associated sash and door business, The McClelland Company. He continued to run the three companies into the 1940s, living here on Oak Lane. At age 70, he sold this house in 1945, and then he sold the three firms to Sidney Rose in 1946, who then closed the

first two companies. Horace and Dorothy then retired to her native Canada. The house was converted to a duplex in the 1950s, and then to a 5-unit apartment building by 1965. In 2008, the current owners, Rebecca and Bill McCarley, began the process of converting the property back into a single family home. The house once again conveys its spacious quality, with large rooms, excellent woodwork, tile work on six fireplaces, and character dating to 1903.
