




The American Commercial and Savings Bank building, the tallest building in the Quad City area, is located at 201 West 3rd Street. It is a twelve-story structure with a three-story clock tower built of limestone over a steel frame. The lower story facade possesses beautiful and expressive detail, seen in the ornate, metal entrance, the full-size columns with stylized capitals, and the deeply recessed, Roman arched windows. The building was designed by the Chicago architectural firm of Weary and Alford. The Walsh-Kahl Construction Company constructed the American Commercial and Savings Bank from 1926-1927. It was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1983.

The main lobby area is a large, two-story room lit by the oversized, Roman arched windows of the east elevation. The entire lobby ceiling is painted in a multi-colored Italian Renaissance design created by Chicago artist Alexander Rinoskopf and executed by the Davenport decorating firm of Hartman and Sedding. In addition there are ten large murals which provide a history of Davenport from 1816 through 1861. The largest mural is a fifteen by nine foot painting by Davenport artist Hiram Thompsen depicting the 1832 signing of the treaty after the Black Hawk War which hangs prominently on the south wall. It was installed in 1928.

The site has long been associated with banking in Davenport being the location of the German Savings Bank, founded in 1869. By 1916 it was the largest bank in Iowa. Anti-German sentiment during World War I resulted in the name change to American Commercial and Savings Bank. When V.O. Figge became associated with the bank in 1931 it was named Davenport Bank and Trust. The bank was sold to Norwest Bank in 1992 and became Wells Fargo Bank in 1998 when Norwest merged with Wells Fargo. In 2005 the building was purchased by Financial District Properties. A \$7.5 million renovation project in 2013 converted the building's fifth, ninth, tenth and eleventh floors into 29 market rate apartments. Wells Fargo Bank remains, alongside other commercial and residential tenants.
