We will have a historical presentation and tour by Ms. Leight Reitz, Events Coordinator. The 'Col' Ballroom was originally a wooden structure in 1896 as the "Sanger-fest Halle" and over 100,000 guests flooded into Davenport for the 4-day event. All hotels and guest rooms were filled to capacity. After this event it was renamed the Coliseum for dancing and social events. It burned down a few years later. The current Coliseum was rebuilt across the street in 1941 of brick to be more fireproof and opened on Labor Day. It had "10,000 feet of glistening dance floor, a balcony café, and booths for 800 persons."

About an SCHPS member

I was born in Spring Valley, IL on the Illinois River, 100 miles west of Chicago on Interstate 80. At 18 years I entered the Novitiate of the Sisters of St. Francis, Peoria, IL where I studied the rule of St. Francis, Gregorian Chant, piano and courses that prepared me to be a teacher. For three years I led a cloistered, monastic life. As Sister Mary Giles I taught children in grades 4 through 8 in parochial schools, classroom music, piano studio and was a church organist and choir director. After a score of years I departed from religious community and worked in campus ministry in Mankato, MN, then Marycrest and Augustana Colleges.

In time I served in three Iowa parishes as Director of Religious Education: Granger, Sacred Heart Cathedral, Davenport and Cedar Rapids. I chose to return to the Quad Cities where I substitute taught in Davenport Community

Schools for 16 years.

I've had the good fortune to travel to countries in Europe five times as well as eastern Canada, Mexico and South America. Each trip was enriching in learning about geography, arts and culture of the people. My interest in historic preservation began 25 years ago when I had the opportunity to join SCHPS. I served on its board and as vice president. In that position I planned programs for the group. The home I chose to buy on Farnam Street, Davenport, was built in 1889. Its abstract informs me that the home rests on land granted to Margaret Alexis LeClaire on May 5, 1840. It was a gift to her from the Natives who first inhabited this land.

I have spent years in the study of piano and have been a church organist for 45 years. I continue with this work in semi-retirement. I enjoy gardening, biking, attending lectures, and programs in the arts.

Along the way I completed a BA degree in music education at St. Ambrose College, Master's degree in Music Education at the University of Illinois and a Master's in College Student Development at Mankato State University.
