We will be meeting at the Mausoleum at 6:00. Deb Williamson and our own Chris Iossi will give a talk and hopefully a slide presentation. There are chairs set up in the Mausoleum. We will have a map of the cemetery & hope to go into the private mausoleum with mosaics by Guastavino Tile Company. Entire program should last about an hour.

Oakdale Memorial Garden was established in 1857 as an independent, not for profit alternative cemetery to City Cemetery. Its century old oaks, gently rolling hills, and reflecting pool denote it as a rural or garden cemetery. The 87 acres were designed by Captain George F. de la Roche a landscape architect from Washington, DC. Massive wrought iron gates from 1896 flank the entrance to the cemetery.

There is one large mausoleum as well as 13 private ones. Other outstanding features of Oakdale include: indoor and outdoor columbariums, baby land, a soldiers lot owned by the U.S. government, orphans from Annie Wittenmeyer, and a pet cemetery.

Oakdale Memorial Garden is listed as an historic district on the National Register of Historic Places, and as a local landmark on the Davenport Register of Historic Properties. It is also listed on the Network to Freedom, a National Park Service registry for sites associated with the Underground Railroad.
