November 10, 2016 Meeting 6:30 PM - Outing Club 2109 Brady Street Davenport, Iowa

"The history of the Outing Club spans more than 100 years. In 1891, three men — two successful businessmen, one a Civil War hero, the other a carriage and early automobile manufacturer, and a Unitarian pastor — drove across the unpaved roads of Davenport on a mission. They were embarking on establishing a club where families could bring their children to dine, where adults, teens and youngsters could enjoy tennis and lawn bowling.

From the very beginning, the focus was on families. The business and social benefits were there, too, but first and foremost — during an era when children weren't allowed in restaurants — parents, and grandparents, aunts and uncles could share one another's company.

Generations of families introduced their daughters to society at the debutante balls and garden parties, witnessed the marriage of their children, and celebrated in the ballroom with dining and dancing. It was a life of party gowns, tuxedos, and learned social behavior in a festive atmosphere."

Rev. Arthur M. Judy, Major Morton L. Marks, & John L. Mason purchased the W. C. Brewster farm in 1891 for \$7,500 in gold coins — \$2,500 less than the asking price. The plan was to remodel the Brewster house to be used as a clubhouse until a new one could be built, and to equip the grounds for outdoor sports. [cont. next side...]



In 1903 the new clubhouse was opened. It was designed by Clausen & Burrows and G. A. Hanssen and cost \$25,000. This showplace was destroyed by fire in April 1905. Temple & Burrows architectural firm was commissioned to rebuild. The grand opening & dedication was held July 1st, 1905. A high, broad porch, sixteen feet wide at the sides and twenty feet wide in front that extended entirely around the building was one of the club's most endearing features. In 1998 a new addition was constructed to this 1905 clubhouse.

Thanks to Connie Heckert's history of The Outing Club, entitled *More Than 100 Years of Fine Traditions: The Outing Club 1891-1999* a pictorial history, with almost 200 photographs and illustrations, and many stories & memories of socializing at The Outing Club.
