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A Great Visit with Great Hosts

Hello again, friends!

Last month, we toured the beautiful William Bettendorf Mansion, which is now the lowa Masonic Home in Bettendorf, lowa. We were hosted by some of the gracious staff of the home - Dave and Misty Overfield and Mandi Martin. They were truly wonderful, and we are very grateful to them for allowing us to tour their facility.

There are exciting things happening out and about this October, not the least of which is our tour of the former Theodore Eldridge home in Davenport!

October Tour: The Theodore Eldridge Home



Theodore Eldridge was born in a small home along Brady Street in 1841. His parents had moved to Davenport a few years before, and were some of the first to settle in Scott County.

His much older relative, Duncan, was one of the pioneers of Scott County and one of its first businessmen. Duncan's son, Jacob, would eventually found the city of Eldridge, a town that is thriving and successful today.

These were the pioneer days of Davenport, when the likes of J.M.D. Burrows worked to build the frontier town into a thriving city. Theodore grew up alongside Davenport in many ways, and remembered firsthand some of the key events in the history of the city, such as the murder of Colonel George Davenport.

In 1863, Theodore married another early Scott county native, Anna Parkhurst. They ran a successful restaurant located at Third Avenue and Perry Street for several years, and then Theodore began a real estate business, which was also extremely successful.

Theodore and Anna built the house at 1404 East 10th Street in 1874, and lived in it for the rest of their lives. Theodore retired just after the turn of the 20th Century, and passed away in 1908. Anna would go on to be the oldest living pioneer of Scott County for her time, passing quietly at the age of 94 in 1937.



The house passed through many hands over the next several decades, until it finally ended up in the hands of SCHPS members Adam Myles and Evan Hoke. They have been kind enough to invite us to their home this month and talk about the extensive remodeling work they have done.

Book Club Corner With Nancv Neuhaus

The Local History Book Club met on August 22 at the Hauberg House in Rock Island to discuss 'When the Mississippi Ran Backwards,' by Jay Feldman. Eleven people were in attendance, owing to a competing event that night.

The book is about the New Madrid, MO earthquakes that took place in December of 1811, the result of shifting tectonic plates that indeed caused the Mississippi to temporarily run backwards. In writing this book, the author tied in local disparate groups including Indians, settlers, presidents, and even the nation of Spain.

His book has all the elements of a thriller with Indian uprisings, murder, a disposed rich white family to cause trouble, and a catastrophic natural event.

We discussed at length the physicality of the earthquakes along the Mississippi Valley and how the tremors reverberated for months. Our question remains: how is fracking going to affect this little known fault line in the future? Will it come to Scott County next time?
