Ward Olson December 5, 1923 – April 16,2020

Tribute to Ward from SCHPS --written by Mary Costello

It was probably in 2010. Well-known artist Ward Olson offered SCHPS his large drawings of local buildings to be made into notecards for promotion of our Historic Preservation work and as a fundraiser. I was assigned to get the artwork from him. On a sunny afternoon that fall, I visited him at his unusual, nature-covered pink house. His yard was cool, as trees and bushes swayed in the breeze. Ward graciously invited me in. A painting of his wife, Beverly, dominated the pink family room. They had been married for 58 years. He talked about her with great affection. It was clear he was missing her greatly. I sensed his loneliness in that lovely, art-filled house.

We borrowed from him eight of his original architecturally-precise pen and ink drawings from which our cards were made. The buildings were softened with additions of old-fashioned coaches, top hats and the long, flowing gowns of the late 1800s and turn-of-the-century period, when many of the historic houses he drew were built. Ward was known for his portraits, riverboats and paintings of famous Quad-City buildings. He seemed to love preserving the look of the past. Olson was very generous with his artwork donating it to fundraisers like the Le Claire House, Vander Veer Botanical Park and others. In so doing, he raised thousands of dollars for their benefit. His notecards have greatly enhanced the work of SCHPS.

Ward Olson lived a long, full life. He served in the Navy on the destroyer, *Samuel M. Moore*, during WWII in the Pacific; returning to the states, he became director of Bawden Brothers Advertising Agency in Rock Island and later of another agency in Davenport, Iowa. After 37 years in the commercial field, he retired and did freelance for 36 years.

He had three children – Tom a doctor in Bettendorf, and two daughters, Susie Johnson in Minnesota and Becki Brown in California along with grandchildren and great grandchildren. His wife died in 2009 and he moved into the Kahl Home in 2017. He said that he drew all his life. In grade school he doodled in his textbooks and he was still drawing in the nursing home when he was 96. He loved dancing, traveling and being with friends and family. As late as last year, he was seen in a golf cart with his son at the Bix; an event where he used to dance with his wife at the McClellan turnaround almost as light and fantastic as Fred Astaire.
